## NOTE 1

Sir Ellis Hicks (Born c1315, England)

On September 19, 1356, he was knighted by Edward, the Black Prince, on the field of battle at Poitiers for bravery in capturing a stand of colors from the French. His portrait, appearing below, was painted when he was 90 years of age and after his family had helped him don the armor. However, this was not the same armor he wore in the battles but was that of the time the portrait was painted. In 1909 the portrait was still hanging in Whitecombe Hall, home of Sir William Hicks-Beach, Prime Minister of England.



## NOTE 2

John Hicks of Totworth (Born c1440, Fortsmouth, Gloucestershire, England)

All sources state that he was a lineal descendant of Sir Ellis Hicks but apparently no definite proof of this statement has been found, nor is it known who were the members of the intervening generations. Probably John was a grandson of Sir Ellis. Perhaps it can never be proved that he was a lineal descendant but it is just as unlikely that it can ever be disproved. Some sources state that John was given the right to the Coat of Arms of Sir Ellis. If true, he must have been a lineal descendant. John was owner of the estate of Totworth, or Tortworth, in Gloucestershire.

## NOTE 3

Thomas Hicks of Totworth (Born c1475, England)

As eldest son, he inherited his father's estate, Totworth, in Gloucestershire, where he spent his entire life.

## NOTE 4

Robert Hicks (Born c1485, England)

Was a London merchant and accumulated a considerable fortune. His wife was a daughter of William Arthur of Clapham.

## NOTE 5

Baptist Hicks (Born c1526, England)

Was appointed by King James as one of the Counsellors of the Virginia Colony under the second charter, with term of office for life unless displaced.

## NOTE 7

Sir Michael Hicks (Born 1543, England)

After leaving college he studied law and became secretary to Lord Burleigh (or Burghley), Queen Elizabeth's Chief Counsellor and Lord High Treasurer. In 1604 he purchased the castle and manor of Beaverstone in Gloucestershire. He was knighted July 21, 1619, and from him descended the knightly family in Gloucestershire, a full account of which is in the English Heraldry Records.

Sir Baptist Hicks, Viscount Campden (Born 1551, England)

Was a great and very charitable London merchant. He built Hicks Hall there and also built and endowed market houses and hospitals. He was knighted by King James I and created Baron Hicks, of Ilmington, in the County of Warwick. On May 5, 1628, King Charles I created him a Peer of the Realm, and made him Viscount Campden, of Campden.

## NOTE 11

Williams Hicks, Esq., of Beaverstone (Born c1565, England)

Was created Baronet July 25, 1619. His wife was a daughter of William, Lord Paget.

Sir William Airmyn (Born c1570, England)

Was created Baronet November 28, 1619. When he died in 1651 he was succeeded in the Baronetcy by William (born 7-14-1622), son by his first wife, Elizabeth, only daughter of Sir Michael Hicks, Knight, of Beaverstone Castle in the County of Gloucester. (Article on Airmyn in Burke's Extinct Baronetcies.)

## NOTE 12

Edward Noel (Born c1575, England)

When Sir Baptist Hicks, Viscount Campden, died in 1629 without male issue Baron Edward Noel, who had married Sir Baptist's eldest daughter, Juliana, succeeded to the title of Lord Hicks and Viscount Campden. He died in 1643.

## NOTE 13

Henry Hicks (Born 1552, England)

Entered the Church and had a son who was also a priest.

George Hicks (Born c1565, England)

Entered the Army, married late in life and had two sons.

## NOTE 14

John Hicks (Born 1574, England)

Died while a student at St. George (or St. Mary's) College, Oxford.

Ephraim Hicks (Born 1576, England)

Died in France while a youth.

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## NOTE 14 - Continued

Richard Henlen (Born c1575, England)

Was a London merchant.

Robert Hicks (Born c1580, Gloucestershire, England)

Was a partner with his father-in-law in the tannery and leather dressing (fellmonger) business in Southwark, London. In 1621, after his father-in-law's death, he made over his business to his eldest son, Thomas, who had been brought up in the trade, and sailed from England in the ship "Fortune", which landed at Plymouth, Mass., November 11, 1621. That ship brought over many of those who could not obtain passage on the "Mayflower", which had landed at Plymouth the previous November.

Robert settled in Sudbury, Mass., where he was one of the 27 heads of families recorded as taking up land in that town. Later he removed to Scituate where he was joined by his brother, Thomas, and his family and also by John and Stephen, sons by his first marriage. At Plymouth, Robert was a merchant and also was called a planter. He was a friend of Miles Standish, Elder Brewster and Governor Bradford, the first authorities in the Plymouth Colony.

Robert Hicks died on land formerly owned by John Alden.

Samuel Hicks (Born 1582, England)

Before commencing business for himself he was clerk in the warehouse of his Cousin Baptist Hicks.

Thomas Hicks (Born 1585, London, England)

Was a clerk in the law office of his father-in-law but about 1630 he left London, followed his brother, Robert, and settled in Scituate, Mass., where he took the Oath of Fidelity in 1644.

James Hicks (Born 1590, London, England)

Was a clerk in the warehouse of his cousin, Baptist Hicks, but when his brother, Samuel, set up in business for himself he went with him as clerk, bookkeeper, etc.

## NOTE 15

Edward, Third Baron Noel (Born c1623, England)

While his father was still living Edward was created Baron Noel of Litchfield but when his father died in 1643 Edward's older brother succeeded to the title. When the older brother died in 1682 Edward succeeded as Baron Hicks, Viscount Campden. Also, on December 1, 1682, Edward was created Earl of Gainsborough.

## NOTE 16

John Hicks (Born c1615, England)

Entered the Army and was killed while serving with Oliver Cromwell at Naseby.

George Hicks (Born c1618, England)

Studied medicine.

## NOTE 17

Thomas Hicks (Born 2-19-1603, London, England)

As it was required that persons emigrating to the New World divest themselves of all property, Thomas' father, Robert Hicks, made over his tannery and leather dressing business to Thomas when he embarked for America in 1621.

John Hicks (Born 10-25-1607, London, England)

Was left in England to be educated when his father went to America in 1621 and was educated at Oxford. He followed to America in 1635 and lived for a time at Weymouth, Mass., but later he moved to Newport, R. I., and still later, in 1642, he moved to Hempstead, L. I. The first patent (October, 1645) for land at

## NOTE 17 - Continued

Flushing, granted by Governor Kieft (the Dutch governor from 1638 to 1647) to English immigrants included John Hicks.

He was Adjuster of Indian Land Claims in 1647 and in 1653 he was Representative from Flushing to a convention in New Amsterdam called by Governor Stuyvesant. He was one of the subscribing witnesses to the July 4, 1657, treaty between the governor of the Province of New Amsterdam and the Indian tribes of the Long Island area (See Appendix A to accompany Note 17.) In 1663 he was the delegate from Long Island to a council, the aim of which was to obtain from the General Court at Hartford aid against the Dutch.

In February, 1665, John Hicks was the delegate from Hempstead to a council called by Governor Richard Nicholl, the first English governor of the newly acquired province, now named New York, "to make additions and alterations to existing laws". In 1666 he was Justice of the Peace and on March 6th of that year he was granted patents of land in Hempstead. Minutes of the Executive Council of the Province of New York show that on October 19, 1666, he and one Gildersleve represented the Town of Hempstead in making an agreement with the Matinnicock Indians covering sale of lands to the inhabitants.

Among those who were members of the National Society of Colonial Dames by right of descent from John Hicks were Mary Marshall Martin (Note 715) and Eleanor Haywood Mason (Note 716).

Herodias (Horrod) Long (Born 1624, England)

Was from a good family and wealthy in her own name. When John Hicks married her by license issued in London March 14, 1636/7 she was only 13 years old. They went to Weymouth, Mass., and then in 1641, to Newport, R. I. They quarreled (probably because she became an emotional Quaker) and separated. In 1642 he left and went to the western part of Long Island, then under Dutch rule.

There has been a suggestion in some genealogical or historical publications that as she subsequently lived with, and had children by, George Gardiner, she was living in adultery. However, before she married Mr. Gardiner in a Quaker ceremony on December 2, 1643, a divorce had been granted to her in Rhode Island. The charge that she was not legally divorced and later legally married seems to have originated with those who did not regard a Rhode Island divorce (where Quakers were harbored) or a Quaker marriage as legal.

Especially in Massachusetts, Quakers were anathema to the prevailing religion and looked at askance. To be a Quaker was to invite imprisonment and torture. On May 11, 1658, Herodias, then a nursing mother with babe in arms, and Mary Stanton, either a friend or sister-in-law, made an arduous journey of 60 miles through practically a wilderness and came from Newport to Weymouth to give religious testimony. They were arrested, thrown in jail and later taken before Governor John Endicott at Boston. He sentenced both to receive ten lashes with a three-fold knotted whip of cords and then to be imprisoned an additional 14 days. According to the record, after this "savage, inhuman and bloody execution upon her, Herodias kneeled down and prayed the Lord to forgive" Governor Endicott.

Rachel Taylor, Widow Starr (Born c1615)

Was the widow of Dr. Thomas Starr who was baptized 12-31-1615 in St. Mary's Church, Ashford, County Kent, England, and died 10-26-1658 in Charlestown, Mass. In 1637 he was surgeon in the forces sent against the Pequot Indians.

Stephen Hicks (Born c1609, London, England)

Went with his brother, John, to Long Island in 1642, settled at Flushing and resided there until his death.

Samuel Hicks (Born c1612, London, England)

In 1639 his father conveyed to him his estate in Plymouth, including all land between Middle and Leyden Streets. Samuel lived at Plymouth until 1643 and while there he contributed a sixteenth of the cost of building a bark of 40 or 50 tons. In 1643 he removed to Nanset (later Eastham) and was a deputy there in 1647 and 1648. In 1649 he was representative of Eastham. On October 3, 1660,

he was admitted as an inhabitant of Barnstable and while there was engaged in promoting settlement of Dartmouth, to which place he removed in 1670.

Ephraim Hicks (Born c1616, London, England)

Was included in the August, 1643, list of Plymouth, Mass., men able to carry arms. He died three months after marriage.

Elizabeth Howland (Born c1630)

Was third daughter of John Howland (born 1592) who, at age 28, was the thirteenth signer in the cabin of the "Mayflower" of the memorable November 21, 1620, compact. John was one of the ten "principal men" sent out from Cape Cod Harbor to select a place for a settlement and who chose Plymouth. He was one of the freemen in the Governor's "counsell" of seven members. In 1633 and 1634 he was assessor and in 1635 he was a member of Governor Bradford's Council. He was selectman in 1666 and deputy of the Plymouth General Court in 1652-1656, 1658, 1661, 1663, 1666, 1667 and 1670. He lived at "Rocky Nook" and died February 23, 1673. His wife was Elizabeth Tilley, born in 1607, daughter of John Tilley of the "Mayflower".

Edward Bangs (Born 1591, Chichester, County Sussex, England)

Came from England to Plymouth, Mass., on the same (1622) voyage of the "Ann" on which his future wife, Lydia Hicks, and her mother took passage. He received a grant of four acres of land at Plymouth and was listed as a "freeman" in 1633. He was one of the assessors in 1634, 1635 and 1636. In 1636-37 he was a member of the Grand Inquest (Grand Jury) "sworn to enquire of all abuses within the body of the Government" and again in 1638, 1640, and 1641. In 1643 he was listed at Plymouth as one able to bear arms.

A shipwright by trade, he superintended the building of the first vessels launched at Plymouth and the Court granted him 80 acres of land in consideration of his contributing a sixteenth of the cost, 200 pounds, of building "a barque of 40 or 50 tons burthen".

In 1644 Edward Bangs moved to Newsett, later Eastham, and was listed as a freeman of that place in 1645. In 1651 he and Rebecca, his second wife, deeded land at Plymouth (Plymouth Registry, Vol. I, page 209). From 1646 to 1665 he was Eastham's town treasurer and was selectman about 1665. In 1657 he was licensed as a merchant at Eastham where he was captain of the guard against Indians.

His first wife died about 1634 and he married as his second wife, Rebecca. By her he had several children, including Lt. Joshua, born 1635, Rebecca, born 1637, and Captain Jonathan, born 1640. Edward Bangs died in 1678.

## NOTE 18

Timothy Hicks (Born c1612, England)

Was a shipwright. He emigrated to America and at first lived at Boston but later removed to Salem. His wife, Dorcas, died at Salem January 5, 1673.

Richard Hicks (Born c1615, England)

Emigrated from England to America.

## NOTE 19

Zachariah Hicks (Born 1628, England)

Came to America and settled at Cambridge, Mass., although apparently for a time in 1677 he lived at Dorchester. On May 27, 1663, he was in the list of freemen of Massachusetts.

Daniel Hicks (Born c1632)

Lived at Scituate, Mass. There is record of his presence there in 1657. Also, there is record of his having been assigned a portion of the common land of Scituate in 1673.

## NOTE 19 - Continued

Samuel Hicks (Born 1637)

Some time after 1662 he was admitted as an inhabitant of Barnstable, but later lived at Dorchester, Mass., where in 1677, he was listed as a freeman of that place.

## NOTE 21

Thomas Hicks (Born 1640, Weymouth, Mass.)

As stated in Note 17, his father moved to Hempstead, L. I., in 1642 when Thomas was two years old. On October 12, 1684, Thomas was granted a license to purchase from the Indians a tract of land on Long Island. About this time he obtained a grant of land on Madman's Neck (now Little Neck). In 1686 he was captain of Queens County troops and was colonel in 1693. On May 22, 1693, he wrote the Council for instructions in case of an Indian attack and the May 24th reply requested him to send the Indians (presumably the ring-leaders) to New York.

Thomas Hicks was the first judge of the Court of Common Pleas, holding that office until 1699. He was a member of the Assembly, 1701-02, and was high sheriff of Queens County, 1698 and 1702-03. He defended Samuel Brownas, a Quaker, in his difficulty with the Hempstead churchmen for attacking their doctrines and ceremonies (See Appendix B to accompany Note 21.) That defense introduced the Hicks family to the enthusiastic Quakers then invading Long Island.

Among those who were members of the National Society of Colonial Dames by right of descent from Thomas Hicks were Mary Marshall Martin (Note 715) and Eleanor Haywood Mason (Note 716).

William Haviland (Born 1626)

Was a son of Matthew Haviland, an alderman of Bristol, England. William left Rhode Island and settled at Little Neck, L. I.

Josias Starr (Born c1643)

Was a son of his wife's stepmother, Rachel Taylor (Widow Starr) by her first husband. He resided at Danbury, Conn., as revealed by a deed executed November 16, 1689.

## NOTE 24

John Bangs (Born c1634)

In 1644, when John was about ten years old, his family moved from Plymouth to Eastham, Mass. He was a legal voter of that place in 1655, 1675 and 1695. There he took the Oath of Fidelity in 1657, was sworn in as constable on May 29, 1667, was listed as a freeman of Eastham in 1670 and was a member of the "Grand Inquest" (Grand Jury) in 1673. His will, dated January 27, 1703, was probated May 17, 1708.

## NOTE 25

Thomas Leonard, M.D. (Born 1641)

Came from England and settled at Plymouth, Mass. He was a physician, a deacon, and at times served as town clerk and as judge of the Court of Common Pleas.

Joseph Williams (Born 1642, Taunton, Mass.)

Served in the Colonial Wars.

## NOTE 29

Peter Hicks (Born c1681)

After marriage to Sarah, the young widow of Joseph Mather, Peter removed to South Carolina where he was engaged in the founding of Dorchester.

## NOTE 30

Thomas Hicks (Born 1667, Flushing, L. I.)

Was high sheriff of Queens County in 1702/3 and lived at Hicksville, L. I.

## NOTE 30 - Continued

Jacob Hicks (Born 1669, Hempstead, L. I.)

There is an April 10, 1738, muster roll of "Captain Jacob Hicks Company" of Hempstead.

Jacob was impressed by the earnestness of the Friends but was a staunch member of St. George's Episcopal Church at Hempstead. Thomas Chalkley, a powerful itinerant Quaker minister, lodged with him on two visits in the neighborhood but Jacob did not become a Quaker although he did open his home to the Friends for their monthly worship. The lingering emotionalism so strongly displayed by the sect in the previous generation disturbed him.

Hannah Carpenter (Born 1672)

Was daughter of a founder of the Baptist Church in America and, although wife of a staunch Episcopalian, she held nonconformist views.

Issac Hicks (Born c1678)

Was a member of the grand jury which, in 1702 and 1703, considered the case of Samuel Brownas, the Quaker preacher. (See Appendix B to accompany Note 30.) He was a surveyor and on September 18, 1719, he rendered an account of wages and disbursements incurred in running a line between New York and New Jersey. On November 23, 1720, he and William Willet were paid for running a line between New York and Connecticut and on April 29, 1725, he was named one of the commissioners to run the boundary line between New York and Connecticut. As of June 25, 1723, Issac Hicks was a Ranger of the Island of Nassau (Long Island) and in 1723 was appointed a judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Queens. By successive reappointments he remained in office until 1734. He was a member of the Assembly from 1716 to 1739.

Elinor (Eleanor) Ellison (Born c1682)

Was daughter of Thomas Ellison (died 1697) and Martha Champion.

John Hicks (Born c1679, Long Island)

In Liber B-2, Pages 654, 655, Queens County Register's Office, Jamaica, N. Y., is recorded a deed, dated February 27, 1700, evidencing gift of "three lotts of upland and a piece of salt marsh" at Flushing by Thomas Hicks (Note 21) to his son, John Hicks, in consideration of "ye naturall affection & love that I bear to my Son John Hicks". The deed was recorded November 5, 1710, by Joseph Smith, Clerk.

## NOTE 31

Joseph Haviland (Born c1657, probably Newport, R. I.)

Was with the family at the time of the move to Long Island but later he left there. On August 16, 1701, he was a member of the Common Council of the borough town of Westchester and was trustee of the town from October 15, 1698, to September 14, 1700. He was vestryman of the parish church in 1701 and 1702. On June 27, 1711, he released land at Westchester to Richard Ward, having moved shortly before that to Shrewsbury, N. J.

## NOTE 32

Jacob Hicks (Born c1673, Dartmouth, Mass.)

Was a farmer in that part of Dartmouth which is now Westport. It is not definitely established whether Jacob was son or grandson of Samuel Hicks (Note 17). Records simply state that he was Samuel's descendant but the length of time between their birth dates makes it probable that he was a grandson. Also, if grandson, it is not known whether he was a son of Robert or Henry Hicks, or who his mother was. This is left for later research.

## NOTE 36

George Leonard (Born 1671)

Was a first settler and a large landed proprietor at Norton, Mass., where he was a major in the militia and judge of the Court of Common Pleas.

## NOTE 38

John Hicks (Born 1696)

Removed from Cambridge to Westboro and then to Sutton, Mass., in 1743 and was selectman of the town from 1748 to 1750 and in 1754, 1755 and 1760.

## NOTE 42

Thomas Hicks (Born c1696)

Margaret Hicks (Born c1709)

Were half first cousins since Thomas' father, Thomas, and Margaret's father, Issac, were half brothers (Note 30). He was appointed one of the judges of Queens County, N. Y., in 1738 and, by successive appointments, continued in office until he resigned, because of age, in 1774. Thomas Hicks represented Queens County in the first Provincial Congress May 22, 1775, and again in the third Provincial Congress May 18, 1776, both meeting in New York.

## NOTE 43

Temperance Titus (Born 1707)

Phoebe Titus (Born 1717)

David Titus (Born 1719)

Were brother and sisters.

John Hicks (Born 12-25-1711, Hempstead, L. I.)

Was influenced by the monthly gatherings of Quakers held in his father's home and longed for the great joy which came to Friends with their certainty of the forgiveness and love of God. He believed they were actually reviving the Christianity of the Apostles by removing extraneous forms and customs which had grown up. Therefore, a few years before the birth of his son, Elias, he joined the Society by conviction and became a faithful member of the Westbury Monthly Meeting.

Martha Smith (Born 9-30-1709)

Her son, Elias, the Quaker divine, wrote of her that she "was never in strict fellowship with any religious society, but was a woman of strict morality and generally beloved and respected by her neighbors, and acquaintances, of every profession."

As the Hicks family had been repulsed in earlier days by the enthusiasm of the Quaker exhorters on the Newtown and Hempstead streets, so Martha was repulsed by the Quietism then dominant in the Society. The atmosphere of silent waiting upon God in the Meetings for Worship, with all human impulses stifled, all "creaturely activities" set aside, did not appeal to her. She found it hard on First Day mornings to achieve a spiritual vacuum within her soul that the Divine word might come to her. She was never sure whether the voice of God or her own instincts commanded her attention. Martha Smith was an individualist who could not bring herself to yield her own opinion to the judgement of the group as required by the Quaker Meeting for Business. Social Mysticism did not "speak to her condition."

Phebe Powell (Born 3-16-1716, Long Island)

Was clerk of the Westbury (L. I.) Monthly Meeting of Friends for several years before her marriage.

## NOTE 44

Gilbert Hicks (Born c1715)

Because Gilbert's father-in-law, Joseph Rodman, and his family were consistent members of the Society of Friends and he was not a member, his and Mary's marriage was clandestine, a source of sorrow to the parents. But the young couple was forgiven and Joseph proposed that they settle in the "New Countries", as Pennsylvania was then called, on a 600-acre tract of land he owned on the Delaware River 20 miles east of Philadelphia. They emigrated in 1747 or 1748 and their son was born at the new home on the 28th day of the fourth month of 1748 (old style).

## NOTE 44 - Continued

Gilbert Hicks moved to Attleboro, Mass., where he became Justice of the Peace. He sided earnestly and openly with the Crown in the Revolutionary War and, as Justice of the Peace, he read the Royal Proclamation from his doorstep. A squad of American troops was then sent to arrest him but a faithful slave overheard the squad leader inquiring the way to the Hicks home and made such speed that he was able to give timely warning. Hicks then rode a fleet horse in one direction while the slave, dressed in his master's clothes and riding his master's horse, led the pursuers on a long and fruitless chase.

Hicks made his way within the British lines and at the close of war fled to Nova Scotia. There, miserable and wrecked in health and property, he met death at the hands of assassins, presumably footpads.

Margaret Hicks (Born 1708/9)

See Note 42.

James Hicks (Born 1722)

Deborah Hicks (Born 1724)

Were first cousins, Issac Hicks (Note 30), father of James, and William Hicks (Note 30), father of Deborah, having been brothers.

## NOTE 45

Robert Hicks (Baptized 5-21-1713, Hempstead, L. I.)

William Hicks (Baptized 3-28-1725, Hempstead, L. I.)

Thomas Hicks (Baptized 6-19-1726, Hempstead, L. I.)

One source, stating that Robert was born in 1706, asserts that he was a son of Thomas Hicks and Mary Doughty (Note 21) but that cannot be. If that was his year of birth and he was son of Thomas and Mary then the father was 66 and Mary Doughty Hicks was 54 since she was born in 1652. Moreover, Robert was not his parents' youngest child. The source also states that the Thomas who, with Robert and William, migrated to North Carolina, was not their full brother but was their half brother, son of Thomas Hicks by his first wife, Mary Butler, Widow Washburn (Note 21). However, that Thomas died in 1712 and had been dead 28 years when Robert, William and their brother, Thomas, left Long Island. The father of the Thomas Hicks who had died in 1712 died in 1740 and his will, dated May 15, 1727, says his eldest son, Thomas, was then deceased. None of the numerous other sources listing the issue of Thomas Hicks and his two wives includes a Robert.

It is known that around 1740 three men, Robert, William and Thomas Hicks, left Long Island and went to what is now Granville County, N. C., probably stopping a short while in Surry County, Va., enroute. The Earl of Granville granted them land near the present site of Oxford. William's grant was dated March 5, 1749. Robert had from the Earl of Granville at least three grants. The first, dated October 26, 1752, was for 350 acres and was to Robert Hicks, Gent. The second, dated July 29, 1760, was for 318 acres and the third, dated August 5, 1761, to Robert Hicks, Planter, was for 277 acres. The three totaled 945 acres and all required that Robert Hicks pay to Lord Granville a yearly quit-rent of three shillings Sterling or four shillings "Proclamation money" for each 100 acres. The first also required that within three years the grantee clear and cultivate at the rate of three acres for every hundred acres granted.

## NOTE 45 - Continued

During the second half of the 18th century, Robert Hicks built on his land the home pictured below.



Here, the influence of the Long Island style of architecture is clearly apparent. Robert's brother, William, a "house carpenter" doubtless had a large part in the construction. This house was the family homestead of Robert Hicks and of four generations of his descendants for almost two centuries. It passed out of the family in July of 1890 when Harriet Virginia Britton Hicks, widow of Edward Hubbell Hicks (Note 260) sold it, together with 192 of the original 945 acres to one W. C. Reed. Four years later Reed deeded it to Mary R. De la Croix.

Ever since "memory of man runneth not to the contrary" there has been a tradition in the several Granville County branches of the Hicks family that their ancestors were three brothers, Robert, William and Thomas, who came from Long Island. All evidence points to the conclusion that they were sons of John Hicks and Elinor (Eleanor) Ellison (Note 30) and grandsons of Thomas and Mary Doughty Hicks. There is positive proof that in June 1758 the brothers Robert and William made a trip to Long Island, probably in connection with the settlement of an estate from which they received a considerable sum of money on June 26th. Returning on horseback, they reached Oxford in October.

As further evidence, records of all persons (five) named Thomas Hicks, who were born in the area during this span of time, have been researched and proof developed that all five except this Thomas, son of John and Elinor, lived and died on Long Island. As to Robert, William and Thomas, quite significantly, except for their baptism and of being named in their father's will, there is no history of them or of their descendants on Long Island. This indicates that when their prominent and wealthy grandfather, Thomas Hicks, died in 1740 without

leaving a bequest to them they left home to seek their fortunes. They were then 27, 15 and 14 years old, considered in Colonial times to be of age.

Note 17 records that in October 1645 Governor Kieft granted to John Hicks, great grandfather of Robert, William and Thomas, a patent to land at Flushing, L. I. Recalling that, it is quite significant that the May 19, 1796, will of William Hicks left three slaves to his son, Abner, and one of them went by the name of "Flushing". Since there was then only one Flushing in the nation, it is most improbable that William would have named his slave Flushing unless he had once lived on Long Island, probably at Flushing.

Additional proof that this Robert and William Hicks of Granville County were the two men who returned in June 1758 to Long Island for a brief stay is that in North Carolina Archives can be found the original of a surety bond among the Estate papers of William Hicks, Orange County, 1827. The bond evidences that in New York on July 3, 1758, William Hicks, house carpenter of Granville County, N. C., made bond to Robert Hicks, Merchant, of same place. It set forth that Robert had delivered to William 40 pounds for use and benefit of John Hicks, an infant - meaning "not yet of age" - the nephew of Robert and son of William. The bond provided that "before his next return to North Carolina", William would use 20 pounds to purchase a mare "within the Province of New York" and the remaining 20 pounds "in purchase of land in County of Granville, N. C."

The instrument was signed by William Hicks and witnessed by Thomas Hicks, Esq., Stephen Hicks and Thomas Hicks, Jr. (Thomas, Jr., as then used did not necessarily mean a son by the same name as his father but, absent a son, it could have been a grandson). The son Thomas of Thomas Hicks, Esq., died in 1712, or 46 years before this bond was signed, so the Thomas, Jr. could have been either the Thomas of Note 43 or the Thomas of Note 44, both grandsons of Thomas Hicks, Esq.

On July 6, 1758, Thomas Hicks, Esq., appeared before Daniel Horsemanden, Esq., a Justice of the Supreme Court of New York, and testified to the signing of the instrument by William Hicks. The paper was recorded on September 20, 1758, in the office of the town clerk of New York, page 32 of Book 35 of Conveyances.

In 1759-1761 and in 1779 Robert Hicks was Justice of the Peace for Granville County. He was a man of considerable wealth, as indicated by the inventory of his estate.

Sarah Rives (Born c1715)

Was daughter of William Rives of Virginia. He removed to Edgecomb County, N. C., and later to Granville County, where he died in 1751. His will (No. 27, unrecorded) mentions Sarah Rives. She married Robert Hicks before the family moved to Granville.

NOTE 50

Gabriel Hicks (Born c1700, Dartmouth, Mass.)

Was a farmer and tanner and owned 100 acres of land at Dartmouth (now Westport).

NOTE 52

George Leonard (Born 1698, Norton, Mass.)

Was Royal Counsellor 1741-1766, deputy of the General Court and Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas.

NOTE 55

George Williams (Born 1717)

In the American Revolution he was an ensign in the 3rd Foot Company of Taunton, Mass. In 1776 the Massachusetts Legislature made him colonel of the 3rd Bristol County Regiment.
