

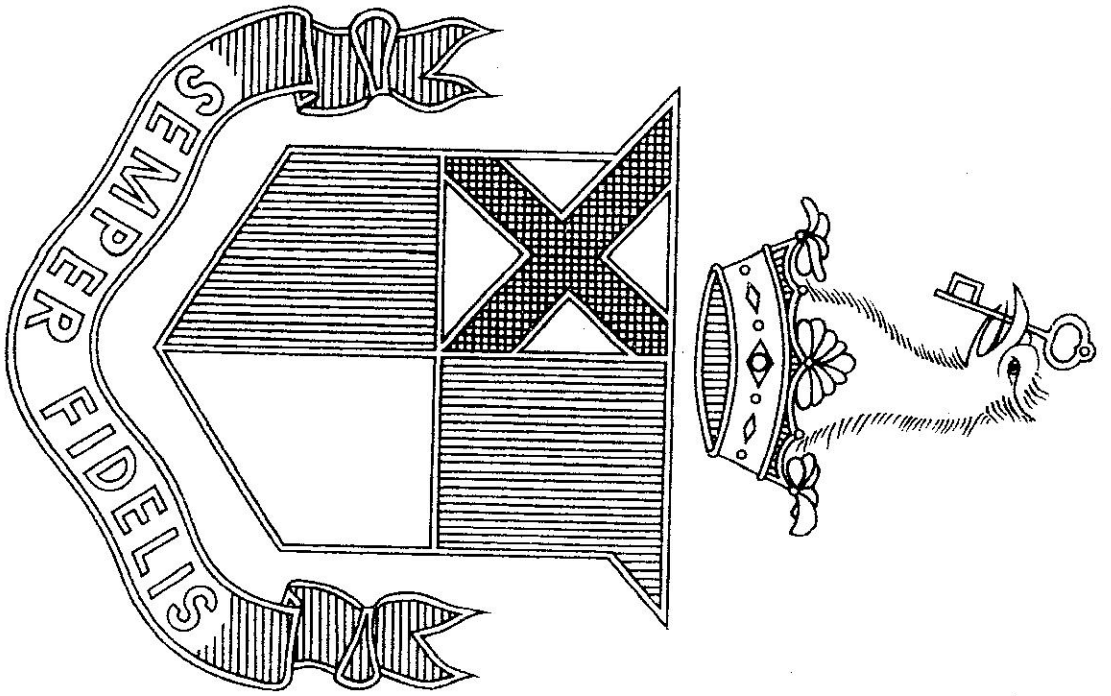

PREFACE

This branch of the Tutt family in the United States, after the first two Richards, is descended directly from Benjamin (1750-1817). He had only one son and the next three generations each had only one son survive. Next, Capt. Charles Learning Tutt, Jr. (1889-1961) had four sons.

Extensive research has been made on the first Richard Tutt. It is certain and independently confirmed that he is related to the Wiltshire and Hampshire Tutts in England. However, no exact date in 1700 of his arrival in Virginia has been obtained - as such manifests are now not legible. It is apparently obvious that he wanted to take part in the development of this new land. It is well known that early settlers who came to Virginia came for economic reasons and not religious.

This branch of the Tutt family in the United States has had in its possession the family crests that are very old and each son or daughter has, for generations, been given a gold ring with such crest. The arms are quarterly argent and gules and are the same as the Tutt family of Idmminster, Wiltshire, England, namely Sir Alexander Tutt de Edmiston. (See Fairbairn's Book of Crests). He was knighted at Whitehall April 18, 1604 by James the First and he died December 15, 1614. His wife was Millicent Burley, daughter of George Burley de Longparish in Southampton County (later called Hampshire) and they had eight children. The third son Richard was born in 1594. Such family dates back to John Tutt de Chilboughton, Gentleman, who married Joane, daughter of Smith de Avington, both Southampton County. His will was proved July 1, 1523 in Wiltshire (P.C.C. 10 Bodfelde).

An early recording of a Tutt family was found in The History of Wiltshire, Volume 6, 1662 published by Oxford University Press and edited by Elizabeth Critall: "The Borough of Wilton - In 1236 Thomas Tut, with the assent of the Bishop of Salisbury, conveyed to the Vicar of St. Peter's half hide of land in Washern." (C.F. 25 (1) 250/10/58).

This Tutt family through tradition has a pure English heritage.

TUTT

Richard Tuttle of Richmond and King George Counties, Virginia died in King George County, 1728. Will on file and written Feb. 27, 1728 - witnessed by Adam Cunningham, Joseph Ferguson and signed by Richard Tuttle. Presented at King George County Court March 7, 1728. Deed on file in Westmoreland County dated May 26, 1703 from Richard Tuttle of Sittenbourne Parish, Richmond County. Such deed conveyed a tract of land which was given to him by his aunt, Mrs. Ann Butler (then by the name Ann Bowden a/s. Harris) on June 24, 1700. She was the wife of Tobias Butler who died 1698 - she then later married George Bowden and finally Thomas Scruggs, who died in 1714. Richard Tuttle had extensive land holdings and came to America with strong financial resources. May 2, 1705 the court appointed him Surveyor of Highways in that area. He lived in that part of Richmond County that later became King George County. Married Mary Underwood May 26, 1703. She was the daughter of Major William Underwood (1649-1717) and his wife Mary Butler. She married second John Fox of Spotsylvania County 1745. He was the son of Colonel William Underwood who settled at Isle of Wight in Virginia in 1620 and died in Rappahannock County in 1662. His wife was Elizabeth Moseley, who died just after 1665, daughter of William Moseley of Lancaster County. He was the son of William Underwood who married Margaret. On his death she married Col. John Upton in 1644. Col. John Upton died about 1651.

8. Mary² Tuttle died young.

Colonel Richard² Tuttle (Richard¹) of St. George's Parish, King George County, Virginia. Will dated Jan. 22, 1766; proved Spotsylvania County March 2, 1767; moved to Spotsylvania County in 1732 and made Commissioner of Peace for county in March 1734 through 1735; in 1738 appointed Inspector of Tobacco in

Fredericksburg; Lieutenant of Horse Oct. 6, 1736, under Capt. Francis Tallafarro; named Captain of Horse Sept. 7, 1742; in 1749 installed Ducking Stool (Note A); Major of Horse Nov. 18, 1750; Justice of the County (1751-55) (Note B); County Sheriff Sept. 6, 1748; Major of Militia Nov. 18, 1752; purchased land from Nathaniel Pope in May 1753; Colonel of Militia Spotsylvania Co. Oct. 4, 1757. Associated in business with Col. Fielding Lewis, who was married to Betty (1733-1797), sister of George Washington (1732-1799). He was considered an important gentleman and lived just outside Fredericksburg on property that now has a golf course. He owned extensive property, including 500 acres in what is today Culpeper County on the first fork of the Rapidan River. Married Oct. 7, 1731 Elizabeth, daughter of Richard Johnson (died Nov. 1726) of Spotsylvania County by his wife Jael (died 1733), who was Jael Tallafarro of Essex County and daughter of Charles Tallafarro. Jael was widow of William Williams. Elizabeth died 1767.

1. Captain James³ Tutt born Oct. 9, 1734, Spotsylvania County. Married Ann Minor in 1777. Captain Company of Militia with commission dated April 2, 1776; took oath Sept. 18, 1777. Oct. 11, 1786 named Commissioner, Vestryman St. George Parish 1775-1776. Will dated Jan. 10, 1780 - proved Jan. 18, 1790 Culpeper County.
 - (a) Charles⁴ Minor Tutt married Joanna Royston.
 - (b) James⁴ Minor Tutt moved to Lexington, Kentucky.
 - (c) Matilda⁴ Churchill Tutt married Elliott Royston, then second Richard⁴ Elisey Tutt.

2. Richard³ Tutt born Feb. 25, 1736, and died 1771. Lived in Culpeper Co. Virginia and married Milion Kenyon, daughter of Abraham Kenyon and Elizabeth Waddington.
 - (a) James⁴ Tutt married Griselda Brown.
 - (b) Archibald⁴ Tutt married Catherine Bowle Pendleton Dec. 8, 1789, daughter James Pendleton of Culpeper County who died 1793 and had children Thomas⁵, Archibald⁵, James⁵, William⁵, Pendleton⁵, Peggy⁵, Matilda⁵, Polly⁵, and Kitty⁵ Bowle Tutt.
 - (c) Elizabeth⁴ Tutt born Jan. 30, 1767, married Gabriel⁵ Tutt son of James³ Tutt.
 - (d) Richard⁴ Tutt married Peggy Garrett 1760.
 - (1) James⁵ Tutt born 1762.

Note A. The ducking stool was used for the punishment of gossiping women of the county who were ducked from four to five times when the offense was flagrant.

Note B. Richard Tutt presided at the trial on Dec. 3, 1751 of Ann Carroll and Mary McDaniel of Fredericksburg who were committed to the jail by Wm. Hunt, Gent. Charged with robbing the clothes of George Washington, Gent. when he was washing in the river the previous summer.

3. Captain John³ Tutt born Spotsylvania Co. August 25, 1744 and died May 8, 1812. Married Mary³ Tutt (1734-1807) daughter of James² Tutt in 1770. Will proved June 15, 1812 in Culpeper Co. Served with distinction in Revolutionary War as Captain of Culpeper Militia starting in 1779.

- (e) Richard⁴ Johnson Tutt married Mildred Connor and moved to Missouri. They had three children; Susan⁵, Henry⁵ and James⁵.

- (g) Elizabeth⁴ Tutt married Hay Tallafarro, brother of William, in 1800. Moved to Cooper Co. KY. They had Charles⁵, Mary⁵, Ann Hay⁵, Margaret Aylett⁵, John⁵, William Aylett⁵, Phillip⁵ and Robert⁵ Tutt.
- (h) Gabriel⁴ Tutt married first Mildred Johnson Minefree, born May 25, 1794 and had one child William⁵ Tutt, born Oct. 2, 1814. Married second Jane Churn Gardner, moved to Missouri and had 13 children; Phillip⁵, Augustin⁵ Tutt born Jan. 14, 1817, Samuel⁵ Johnson Tutt born April 30, 1819 (died St. Louis 1900

and was a doctor), Sarah¹ Ann Tutt born Aug. 11, 1820, Thomas⁴ Edward Tutt born Oct. 9, 1821, Hugh² Henry Tutt born March 20, 1824, Frances⁴ Virginia Tutt born Dec. 25, 1827, Dent⁴ Gardiner Tutt born Sept. 18, 1828, Elizabeth⁴ Rebecca Tutt born June 29, 1830, Felix⁴ Welton Tutt born May 8, 1831, Mildred⁴ Johnson Tutt born March 13, 1833, Ann⁴ Gardiner⁴ Tutt born Dec. 30, 1834, Gabriella⁴ Tutt born May 27, 1837 and Benjamin⁴ George Tutt born Feb. 11, 1840.

4. Benjamin³ Tutt who married Elizabeth Clayton Pendleton.

5. Lieutenant Charles³ Tutt born Sept. 13, 1758 and made Second Lieutenant, 6th Virginia Continental Line Feb. 16, 1776; First Lieutenant June 19, 1776, Aide de Camp Major General Adam Stephen at Battle of Brandywine Sept. 11, 1777 and died at Battle of Germantown between Sept. 26 and Oct. 4, 1777 (Note A). Awarded 2666 acres of land plus a warrant of 468 acres for services. Oldest brother James³ Tutt his heir and divided such lands and slaves with his brothers. (Note B).

Captain Benjamin³ Tutt (Colonel Richard² Richard¹) of the "Retreat" Culpeper Co., Virginia was born August 9, 1750 and died in 1817. Buried at "Cleveland" Culpeper Co., Virginia. He was Captain of Rifles in the Revolution. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Captain Nathaniel Pendleton (1715-1794) of St. Marx Parish, Culpeper Co. (Note C) an officer in the Revolution and his wife Sarah (died 1821), daughter of Phillip and Anne (Coleman) Clayton of Essex Co., Virginia. Captain Pendleton (Note D) was a member of the Cincinnati and Chlet Magistrate of Virginia, 1785. President of Virginia Convention which proposed Declaration of Independence. His wife was his second cousin. His father, Henry Pendleton (1683-1721) of Caroline County was the son of Phillip Pendleton (1650-1721), the immigrant who came to Virginia in 1674 from Norwich, Norfolk County, England. He married Isabella Hurt and their daughter Elizabeth was married to Samuel, the son of John Clayton (Note E).

Note A. War Department Letter No. 1101880 dated March 12, 1906 confirmed that Lt. Charles Tutt last appeared on pay roll of Captain Rillee Avery's Company of the 6th Virginia Continental Line in Oct. 1777.

Note B. As Benjamin³ Tutt was an heir to Lt. Charles³ Tutt, each succeeding generation has been eligible and has been a member of the Society of the Cincinnati from the State Society of Virginia. Such Society was named after the illustrious Roman Lucius Quintus Cincinnatus (439-519B.C.). It was formed at the close of the Revolutionary War by commissioned officers of the Regular Continental Army and Navy "for patriotic, beneficial and social purposes". General George Washington was the first President-General of the Society in 1783. The sword of Lt. Charles Tutt, dated 1777 is always in the possession of the oldest son. At this writing, Charles Learning Tutt III, born 1911, owns such sword and is a member of such Society.

Note C. His son, Nathaniel born 1746, and brother of Elizabeth was a Major in the Continental Army, member of Cincinnati and Alexander Hamilton's second in his duel with Aaron Burr.

Note D. His brother Edmund Pendleton (1721-1803) the famous patriot, Jurist, and member of Congress. See "Edmund Pendleton 1721-1803" by Mays, 2 Vols.

Note E. Henry Pendleton was married in 1701 to Mary Taylor (1688-1770), daughter of Col. James Taylor (d. 1698) of Carlisle, England and Caroline Co., VA and his wife Mary Gregory, married 1682. He was the great grandfather of President James Madison (1751-1836) and great-great grandfather of President (General) Zachary Taylor (1784-1850).

Colonel Charles⁴ Pendleton Tutt (Captain Benjamin³ Colonel Richard² Richard¹) of "Locust Hill" (Just outside Leesburg) Loudoun County, VA. He was a Navy agent at the port of Pensacola, near Santa Rosa Island. He was born in 1780 and died one month before his only son was born Nov. 2, 1832, on Santa Rosa Island. He was an officer in the War of 1812 and was an intimate friend of President Jackson. All members of both families were very close. His widow took her children north on a ship provided by President Jackson. After a narrow escape from shipwreck in a "furious" storm off Cape Hatteras, they reached "Locust Hill". He was married at "Locust Hill" February 14, 1806 to Ann Mason Chichester (1789-1882), daughter of Richard McCarty Chichester (1769-1798) (Note A) of Newington, Fairfax County, VA. and his wife Ann Thomson Mason (1769-1817) (Note B). Richard

Note A. Richard McCarty Chichester (1769-1817) was the son of Col. Richard Chichester III (1736-1796) and Sarah McCarty (d. 1826). They were married in 1766. His father was the son of Richard Chichester II (1690-1743) who married Ellen Ball July 3, 1734, the daughter of Col. William Ball (1676-1744) who married Hannah Beale. They lived in Lancaster Co., VA. He was the brother of Major James Ball (1678-1754). Their father was Capt. William Ball (1646-1690) who married * * Harris in 1675. Sarah McCarty was the daughter of Col. Daniel McCarty (d. 1791) of Westmoreland Co., VA. He married Sinah Ball (1728-1798) daughter of Major James Ball (1678-1754) and Mary Conway (1686-1730). His father was Major Dennis McCarty (d. 1742) who married in 1724 Sarah Ball, (1700-1744) the eldest daughter of Col. William Ball (1676-1744) and sister of Ellen Ball who married Richard Chichester II (1690-1743) in 1734. Their grandfather, Capt. William Ball (1646-1690), was the brother of Col. Joseph Ball (1649-1711) who married Mary Johnson, the parents of Mary Ball (1707-1789) who married Augustine Washington (1694-1743) on March 6, 1730. Their first born became General George Washington (1732-1799). The sisters Sarah Ball McCarty and Ellen Ball Chichester were first cousins one degree removed of Mary Ball Washington. Direct descendants of Colonel Charles Pendleton Tutt who married Ann Mason Chichester have a direct line to George Washington's great grandfather Col. William Ball (1598-1680) who married Hannah Athral in 1636 and came to Virginia 1650.

Note B. Her brother, Stevens Thomson Mason, a member of the United States Senate, was the father of Armistead T. Mason, a Brigadier General at 28 after distinguishing himself in defense of Norfolk in War of 1812 and was killed in a famous duel Feb. 6, 1819 with his cousin John Mason McCarty.

Chichester was the great grandson of Richard Chichester (1657-1734) who came to Virginia from England about 1690. Such family goes back to Sir Roger of Wildworthy, 1370. Ann Thomson Mason was the daughter of The Honorable Thomson Mason (1733-1785) and Mary-King Barnes of "Raspberry Plain", Loudoun Co., VA. They were married in 1759. He studied law in London and was admitted to Middle Temple on Aug. 14, 1751. Member of the House of Burgesses, 1758-1769. Virginia Assembly 1778-1783. In May 1769 he was on committee with Thomas Jefferson, Edmund Pendleton, Richard Henry Lee, Peyton Randolph, Richard Bland and Robert Carter Nicholas to protest against Taxation without Representation. Judge of the General Court (the first Supreme Court in Virginia) in 1778. Brother of George Mason of "Gunston Hall", author of the Virginia Bill of Rights and the Virginia Constitution of 1776. Such "Bill of Rights" was the chief basis for the Federal Bill of Rights. (Note A) This generation of Masons was the fourth in Virginia. The great grandfather was Colonel George Mason, who came from England in 1651 and died in Stafford County, VA. in 1686.

Dr. Charles Pendleton Tutt (Col. Charles, Capt. Benjamin, Col. Richard, Richard) of Philadelphia was born on Santa Rosa Island, Pensacola, Florida Nov. 2, 1832; died at Philadelphia May 11, 1866. He passed his youth at the old homestead "Locust Hill" near Leesburg, VA. He spent two years at the Univ. of Vermont in Burlington, class of 1854, but because of poor health left college. He spent a year in the mountains of Virginia and improved his health immensely and returned to his studies at the University of Pennsylvania in 1852. He became an office student of Dr. George B. Wood, Professor of the Theory and Practice of Medicine. In 1856 he graduated with honors and later became resident physician in Blackley Hospital, Philadelphia. Elected a district physician of Philadelphia Dispensary in 1858 and held such office for six years. Visiting physician in 1862-65 to Satterlee United States General Hospital in Philadelphia. Physician at Magdalene Hospital. From 1859 visiting physician and librarian and presided over daily clinics. In April 1866 there was an epidemic of typhus fever and it spread through the almshouse and he was in constant attendance upon the sick. April 26, 1866 he retired, ill and was attacked by fever. Death followed May 11, 1866. On Jan. 4, 1859 Dr. Tutt married Rebecca Wain Leaming (b. Jan. 26, 1835; died March 13, 1888) daughter of Jeremiah Fisher Leaming (b. Oct. 17, 1795; d. March 8, 1888) and Rebecca Wain (1802-1848). He graduated from Dickinson College in 1811 and was head of the House of Wain, Leaming & Co. in Philadelphia. He was the son of Thomas Leaming III (1748-1797) of Cape May, New Jersey and Philadelphia. Thomas Leaming III fought with Washington at Princeton, Trenton and Germantown. He was officer in First City Troop and was married Aug. 19 1779 to Rebecca Fisher

(1757-1833) (Note A), daughter of Samuel Fisher and Elizabeth Coleman. His father, Thomas Learning (1718-1795) of Cape May was the son of Thomas Learning (1674-1723) of Southampton, Long Island, New York whose mother was Hannah Whildin (1683-1723), great granddaughter of John Howland, The Pilgrim (1592-1672) who arrived Dec. 21, 1620 on the "Mayflower". (Note B) The father of Thomas Learning, Senior, was Christopher Learning (1649-1695) who came to Southampton, Long Island from England in 1670. (Note C) Rebecca Wain was the daughter of Hon. Robert Wain, Jr. (1765-1836) of Philadelphia, member of Congress (1799-1800) and Phoebe Lewis (1768-1848). He was the great grandson of Nicholas Wain (1650-1721) who came to the United States on the ship "Welcome" to Pennsylvania with William Penn arriving at New Castle, Delaware River, Oct. 27, 1682. (Note D) Phoebe Lewis was the great granddaughter of Ellis Lewis, born in Wales in 1680 and arrived in Philadelphia in 1708 and settled in Wilmington, Delaware. He died Aug. 31, 1740. Such family dates to 1071 in England.

Charles^e Learning Tutt (Dr. Charles^e, Col. Charles^e, Capt. Benjamin^e, Col. Richard^e, Richard) was born in Philadelphia on Feb. 14, 1864. He attended and graduated from the Ury Boarding School after which he became a student of the Ferris Institute. He became a clerk for Peter Wright & Co. and after two years accepted a position in the main office of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company where he stayed two years. In 1884 he moved to Colorado where he bought a ranch eighteen miles northeast of Colorado Springs. For three years he continued in the cattle business at "Thayden", then sold his ranch and started in

Note C. His great grandfather was Christopher Learning, Lord Mayor of London and of Leamington Manor. Originally the name was Lemynge, then Leming and finally Learning.

Note D. The family home "Wain Grove" near Philadelphia and built about 1760 still stands in excellent condition.

Note E. This was the 4th marriage of the Tutt family daughters with the Pendletons.

the real estate business in Colorado Springs with a branch office in Pueblo. He was among the first to enter the Cripple Creek area where he located the C.O.D. Mine on Dec. 30, 1891. Spencer Penrose, a boyhood friend from Philadelphia arrived in Colorado Springs on Dec. 10, 1892 and joined Tutt in operation of this mine. They leased the mine to Joe Troy and Pete Burke. These men sank a shaft and landed on a clearly defined vein of gold. Tutt and Penrose shared in the profits and sold the C.O.D. Mine to a French syndicate at a substantial profit. In 1894, with C.M. MacNeil, they started a company for the treatment of ore in the Cripple Creek District and named it The Cripple Creek Sample and Ore Company. It was too small and was sold. In 1896 the Colorado-Philadelphia Reduction Company was formed in Colorado City with Charles L. Tutt, President; C.M. Mac Neil, Vice President and General Manager; and Spencer Penrose, Secretary and Treasurer. The plant had a capacity of 250 tons per day. Charles L. Tutt and Spencer Penrose also started the town of Gillett. In 1899, Tutt, Penrose and MacNeil also organized the National Gold Extraction Company at Florence, Colo. Also President of Hayden Gold Mining Company; Pennsylvania Gold Developing Company, and Annie Gold Mining Company. With D.C. Jackling, Spencer Penrose, C.M. MacNeil formed the Utah Copper Company July 1, 1904 but sold his interest to Penrose because of ill health in 1905. Enjoyed home on the Columbia River which was referred to as "Tutt's Landing-Washington." They spent summers there between 1896-1909. Longtime friends the Spencer Biddles of Philadelphia had a place nearby. Loved his yacht Anemone built in 1899 at Gosport, England. It sailed from New York Dec. 14, 1905 and passed Strait of Magellan Feb. 18, 1906. Arrived San Diego May 8, 1906. Sailed June 6, 1906 First Trans-Pacific Race to Honolulu representing the New York Yacht Club of which he was a member and placed second to the Lurline arriving June 25, 1906. Died in the old Waldorf-Astoria Hotel (now the location of the Empire State Building) in New York City Jan. 21, 1909. Original member Cheyenne Mountain Country Club 1891 in Colorado Springs. Married Dec. 29, 1885 at Christ Church Chapel in Philadelphia Josephine Thayer (b. Feb. 12, 1858 Philadelphia; died March 1, 1912 Coronado, California), daughter of the Honorable Martin Russell Thayer (b. Petersburg, VA Jan. 27, 1819 - d. Oct. 14, 1906) an eminent jurist and Sophia Dallas Watmough (1831-1891). Judge Thayer was a member of Congress from Pennsylvania (1863-1867) during the presidency of Abraham Lincoln and then as President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in 1875 and re-elected in 1878 and 1888 in Philadelphia. Judge Thayer (Note A) was the son of Martin Thayer (1791-1862) (Note B) and grandson of Josiah Thayer Jr. (1752-1812) of Braintree, Mass. (Note C) who was great-great-great grandson of Richard Thayer, Sr., of Braintree, who came to America from Thornberry, Gloucestershire, England in 1638 and became a freeman of Boston 1640 and died Braintree Aug. 27, 1695. Sophia Watmough was the daughter of Edmund Carmick Watmough (1797-1848) and Maria Chew Nicklin (1800-1864) (Note D) the granddaughter of

Note A. Graduated Univ. of Pennsylvania after spending first two years at Amherst College and was valedictorian of his class.

Note B. His wife was Mary Call Russell (1791-1821) of Petersburg, VA., which family goes back to 1066. Name originally Da Rozell and then anglicized to Russell.

Note C. Josiah Thayer, Jr. was a soldier at the Battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775.

Note D. Her sister Sophia Chew Nicklin married George Mifflin Dallas (1792-1864) Class of 1810 at Princeton, a distinguished lawyer and Vice President of the United States (1845-1849) under President Polk and son of Alexander James Dallas, Secretary of the Treasury under President Madison.

Captain Charles² Learning Tutt Jr. (Charles³, Dr. Charles³, Col. Charles³, Capt. Benjamin³, Col. Richard³, Richard³) was born in Colorado Springs on Jan. 9, 1889. He attended St. George's School, Newport, Rhode Island in 1903 and then changed to The Thacher School, Ojai, California, graduating in 1906. He started in the insurance business and then, on his father's death in 1909, became associated with Spencer Penrose, as they had joint investments in various mining and land interests. He started to manage The Garden City Company, a large land holding west of Garden City, Kansas and was President or Chairman the rest of his life. In 1916 he went to New York with Spencer Penrose to engage the services of Warren and Wetmore as architect for The Broadmoor Hotel. In World War I he served as Captain in the Army in 1917 and 18. He was associated with the World famous Broadmoor Hotel as an officer for the rest of his life. In 1939 he became President and later on Chairman. For years he was the President of El Pomar Investment Company, which owned The Broadmoor Hotel and had extensive other investments. For many years he was also President of Beaver Park Company, Mt. Manitou Park and Incline Railway Company, Manitou and Pike's Peak Railway Company, Pike's Peak Automobile Company, Pike's Peak Auto Highway Company. The First National Bank of Colorado Springs was of great personal interest to him and he was director 41 years and Chairman for 21 years. He was a Director of Kennecott Copper Corporation and Braden Copper Company for 24 years. As a Trustee of the Rio Grande Western Railroad, he helped guide it into a financially sound company and then, after reorganization, became a Director for many years. The First National Bank of Denver had the benefit of his services as a Director a long time. He enjoyed being a member of the Board of Directors of Holly Sugar Corporation. As an officer of the El Pomar Foundation since its formation in 1937, he guided the outstanding programs of this organization as President until his death. He especially enjoyed membership in many clubs. He was President of the Cooking Club from 1939 until

Note A. Benjamin Chew, a brilliant lawyer, was a leader in the Provincial Assembly of Pennsylvania and Register General, Attorney General and in 1774 Chief Justice of Pennsylvania. His home "Cliveden" in 1872 became a property of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. It was damaged in the Battle of Germantown in 1777. His great-great grandfather, John Chew, came on the boat "Charitie" to Virginia in 1624 with three servants and a grant of land. His wife Sarah followed on the boat "Seafoure". They settled at "James Cittle" and a deed issued 1624.

his death and was President of the Broadmoor Golf Club for 25 years and also President of the El Paso Club. He loved hunting and fishing in Utah, Alabama, Wyoming and Colorado and especially his mountain retreat at Unesa Lake in Summit County, Colorado which he bought in 1920. He died in Colorado Springs on Nov. 1, 1961. He married first Eleanor Dexter Armit on Aug. 17, 1909, who was born in Colorado Springs June 7, 1889 and died March 16, 1925. She was the daughter of Captain John Lees Armit (b. Aug. 17, 1849; d. Oct. 22, 1908) who was born in Liege, Belgium and came to Colorado Springs in the spring of 1888. (Note A) He remained in Colorado Springs and became a partner in a law firm with Sheffield Phelps. Later H.G. Lunt became a partner. Then E.E. Brooks was a partner upon retirement of Phelps. They were specialists in mining law. An original member of the Cheyenne Mountain Country Club in 1891 in Colorado Springs. He died on a business trip in Butte, Montana Oct. 22, 1908. He had been commissioned on June 24, 1863 in the Royal Marine Infantry and served in Queen Victoria Guards under Lord Kitchener. He was in the Afghan and Zulu campaigns, serving 13 years in the British Army. His regiment was the 23rd Royal Welsh. His father, John Lees Armit (1796-1884) of Newton Park, Dublin, graduated from Trinity College in 1817. His mother was Elizabeth Yeldham by a second marriage. His father, John Armit (1759-1835) (Note B) was Secretary of the Board of Ordances and was married June 20, 1795 to Mary, daughter of Nathaniel Warren, who was a member of Parliament from 1784 to 1790 and Lord Mayor of Dublin. John Armit's father, William Armit b. 1730, lived at Easter Wemyss in County Fife, Scotland and married Agnes, sister of Sir John Lees of Blackrock on Oct. 23, 1757 in County Avr. Captain Armit married Julia Emma Bradford (b. Nov. 18, 1859 N.Y.C. - d. Sept. 9, 1923 Colo. Springs) on Sept. 20, 1888 in Colorado Springs. She was the daughter of Samuel Dexter Bradford, b. Nov. 17, 1837 in Manchester, England and d. Jan. 12, 1872 in New York City. He also lived in Newport, Rhode Island. His father was Samuel Dexter Bradford, who was born Nov. 6, 1795 in West Roxbury, Massachusetts and died Dec. 18, 1865. He entered Harvard College at 15 and graduated at age 19. He was in business in New York with James McCall, later going to London. He remained there for 18 years, returning then to his family home in West Roxbury. His closest friend was Ralph Waldo Emerson (1803-1882). He was married to Julia Emma Taylor who was born in Durham, England. His father was Reverend John Bradford (Aug. 1756-Jan. 1825). He was ordained a minister in the Unitarian Church at West Roxbury, May 30, 1788. He was married to Mary Dexter May 30, 1779 at Woodstock, Connecticut, a most distinguished family of Ireland who were descendants of Richard de Excester, the Lord Justice of Ireland. His father, John Bradford III, was born in Boston Aug. 24, 1723; married Margaret Barton Nov. 23, 1746 and died May 18, 1784 in Boston. He was a merchant in Boston and in 1776 was "Agent for the Continental Navy for Massachusetts". His father, John Bradford, Jr. emigrated to America at 25 in 1713 and settled at Portsmouth, New Hampshire where he was married to Dorcas Hudson Miller. John Bradford Sr. lived in London and was married at St. Michael's there on Nov. 3, 1687. (Note C) Julia Emma Bradford's mother, Rebecca Selton Maitland Porter, was the daughter of Benjamin Porter (1804-1840). He was the 8th generation in the United States. John Porter, the first to arrive (b. 1596 in England; d. 1676) was on Governor Endicott's military staff and Deputy for Hingham for the Massachusetts General Court.
