of our fellowmen. Thank Christ our Lord.

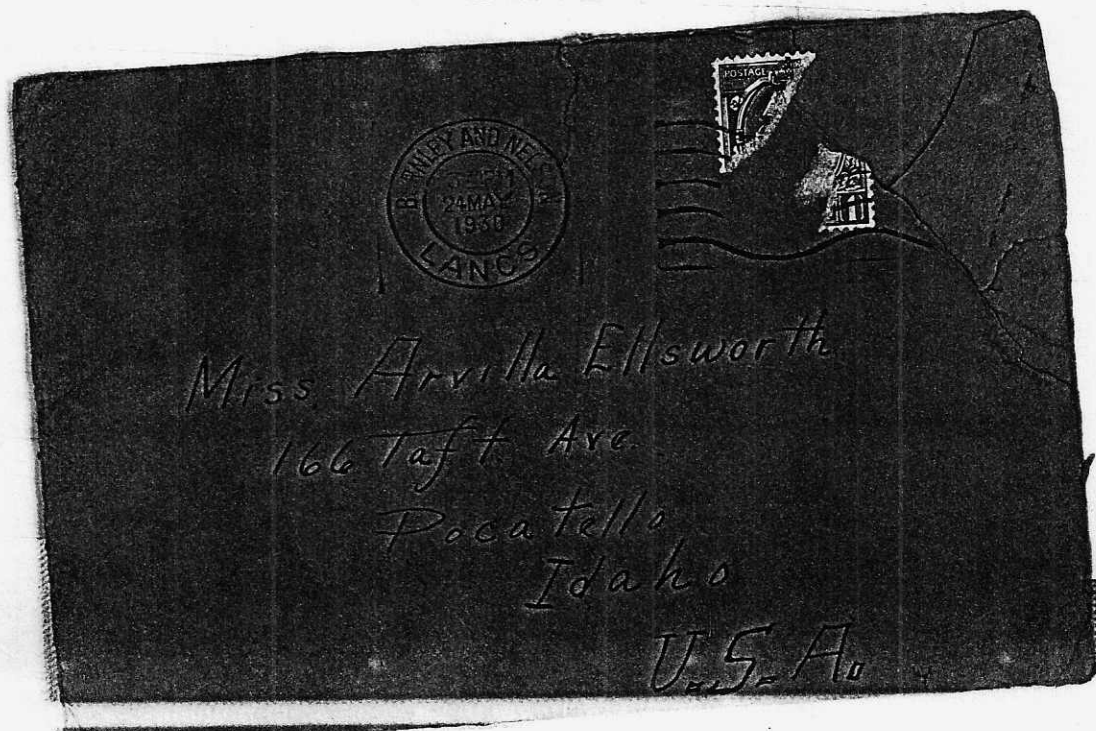
Now keep happy, smile a lot, keep
