individual defendants upon which relief could be granted by the federal court, again alleging lack of jurisdiction by the court over the subject matter of the lawsuit or the persons of the defendants.

In their petition, Kemp and Reed alleged the defendants violated "civil and human rights" of jail inmates by subjecting them to "grievous bodily harm . . . barbarically cruel and unusual punishment" . . . and violation of civil rights guaranteed under the First, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Ninth and 14th

Amendments to the U.S. Constitution

They cite as allegations of "cruel punishment" overcrowding, inadequate heating, sleeping and sanitation, inadequate medical care, restriction of privileges, insufficient food, restriction of attorneys and the courts, arbitrary procedures, and inadequate jail staff.

The man is accused of exposing himself to the two girls, 14 and 15 years old, who had been his students since September, allegedly while his wife was present, the report said. A colonel in the U.S. Army during World War I, World War II and the Korean conflict, Ret. Col. Lloyd R. Garrison died Wednesday at Flow Memorial Hospital. Funeral services for Col. Garrison will be held Saturday at 10 a.m. at St. David's Episcopal Church, with the Rev. Edward Rutland to officiate. Burial will be at IOOF Cemetery, under the direction of the Jack Schmitz and Son Funeral Home.

Col. Garrison was born Oct. 11, 1892, in Carthage, Mo., and lived in Denton before and after his military career.

During World War II,

he spent 50 continuous months in European Theater operations. He was adjutant general of the 4th Army of XIX Corps and was on the general staff of the commanding general of the 12th Army group.

During questioning, Hovila said he could assess the death penalty and that his brother's conviction would not affect his deliberations as a juror.

Defense attorneys Bill Wood and Rusty Duncan exercised the first of their peremptory challenges on the third juror questioned, Robert Thompson of Wichita Falls, because, Duncan said afterwards, they felt Thompson would lean toward imposition of the death penalty upon conviction rather than considering the alternative of life imprisonment.

Odessa Chaffee of Electra was dismissed on a state challenge for cause after she said concern about her invalid mother, whom she cares for, while serving on the jury would make it difficult for her to render a fair and impartial verdict.

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A Thai helicopter whisked former Cambodian Deputy Premier Ieng Sary from his homeland to safety today as Vietnamese tanks were reported closing in, and the ousted official then flew out of Bangkok for Hong Kong, Thai airlines officials said.

Another helicopter also made a brief landing inside Cambodia and then returned to Thailand, but there was no confirmation either of the choppers picked up ex-President Khieu Samphan or other ex-officials of the fallen Phnom Penh government.

Thai Prime Minister Kriangsak Chomanan told reporters earlier he had been told troops still loyal to the toppled Communist regime were spreading out to wage guerrilla war and that Ieng Sary would not flee his country "very soon."

But senior Thai military and Western sources said Khieu Samphan and Ieng Sary, along with about 500 of their associates and their families,
