Dear Sir,-

We received your letter and was glad to hear from you and hope to hear again, I have been pretty busy and neglected answering sooner. My husband says he thinks all the Yanceys are related a little. Maybe you wont care about all I have written but you can cast out what you do not want.

There is so much to tell about. We (the Jacksons) on my mothers side have a family tree which is quite interesting. Five Yanceys came across over from Scotland in 1630 and two went back. As near as I know they settled in Virginia

My husbands grand father settled on a large plantation near South Boston or (Midway Virginia) He was a large slave holder and raised a family of 12 children. My father (Lee Thomas Yancey) being the youngest child. He died in 1926 in Kentucky, when I was 12 years old. My two remaining brothers are still in La Center Ky. on a farm. He and my father and my grand father were all born all born in the same room.

Grand father lived to be 94 years old, the house was built when my great grand father was a small boy, put together mostly with wooden pegs and shop forges nails. The old house is still standing with Yanceys still living in it. about 500 acres in the old plantation, he had 96 slaves at the end of the civil war after giving his married children from seven to ten slaves each. In the corner of the plantation was built a church for colored people, called White Oak Forks. (Baptist Church.)

I used to like to go to the colored church when I was a little boy. We raised corn, tobacco, wheat cotton and stock and had a large orchard. We had a large house weavinf house and made our own cloth, both wool and cotton. We had our own distillery and made our barrels of brandy (not for sale) Father had four brothers in the war and only one came back.

Grandfathers two brothers Richard and Lewis Yancey each hadm sent four sons to the war and only one came back to each family. The yankees not only set the negroes free but they took every thing they had. never even left them a horse, a horse, cow, hog or chicken. My grandmother on my mothers side was a Chandler and they were slave holders. My grandfather was a Frazier.

My brothers Robert Lafayette and Robert Yancey are in LaCenter Ky. My Uncle Abe Yancey lived at the Toll house, in Fresno Co, but has passed away. There were some Yanceys living in Newman Calif. There is a Yancey who is Chief of Police of Long Beach, Calif. My sister met a Yancey at Catalina Island. Calif.

I will have to explain a part of this letter where I say we the Jacksons. You see I am writing this for my husband and when I speak of my people it sounds funny. Well I think I will close this as I know you want this answer I have an extra picture of the old house if you would like one, I would like to hear if you get it. I am yours Truly

Dear Mrs. Yancey

I should have ~~maximised~~ answered your letter before now, but I have not been well. I have also been imm working in Yancey records in Culpepper Co. Va. The book you mention (genealogy of Yancey family) is I feel sure a very short incomplete history of the Y. family, I have not owned a copy of it but I did have it in my house several years ago. and I took from it all verified data, I also secured some records from Raleigh Travers Greens ~~book~~ book of Culpepper Co Va. I hoped to find the little book published in N.Y. and that there was a copy owned by a friend of my husbands here in A-- but ~~when~~ I did secure this data it was not the book but some Yancey data connecting the name Bartlett which is a Yancey name.

Yes I have a copy of Wm L. Yanceys life, It contains little history of him, it is of his life connected with the U.S. Senate and he was also a member of Jefferson Davis' cabinet. when the capitol was in Montgomery Ala. I do not think he ever lived in Richmond Va. I think he died in 1864 or 65 his oldest son was Capt. Wm Yancey who died in Birmingham Ala a few years ago in his 90th year. I have ~~addm~~ practically all the data of his line. He Wm L. descended from Lewis Davis Yancey and Mildred Kavanaugh, his grand father was James Yancey b in Culpepper Co. Va. Wm. L. or Lowndes Yancey fought in the Rev. war then moved to S.C. and then to Ala. I have quite a lot of this data and nearly all the lines worked down from Lewis Davis Y. of Culpepper. Co. Va. I beleive his son James was a first cousin and a contemporery of my ancestor Capt. James of N.C.

My line works this way-- back.
Theodora Hill Carraway-- my daughter.
Tempe Boddie Hill Carraway -me-
Mary Graves Yancey (Hill)
John Green Yancey-- of Warren Co, N.C. He
ry Yancey of Granville Co. N.C.
Lewis Yancey " "
Capt James Yancey of Granville N.C born in Va.
Charles Yancey his will in Hanover Va. leaving land in Granville N.C. to Capt James Yancey.

I have all these wills certified of the first four generations, of course I have about all N.C. Yancey history except a few in Necklenberg Va into N.C. Some years ago a Mr. Shepherd of Cumberland Co. Va. gathered much data, he intended to write a history of Yanceys in Va. but not getting the cooperation he expected, he sent me all his data. along with it the Arms used in 3 separate lines of the Yancey family. this Arms was crude but after verifying it I found it was correct. The motto had been handed down in my line. The Arms had been owned by and Aunt of his a Miss Shepherd who was in her 90th birthday.

The Arms had been given her and preserved for her by her mother who was a Yancey of Va. so I beleive its perfectly authentic. It is a Welch Arms and as you doubtless know 4 or 5 Yancey brothers came to America with their cousin Sir Wm Berkley(afterwards govenor of Va.) in 1649-1642, and settled in Va. These brothers married into Va. families of background.-- some data I have from the Crawford Book-- 2 sons of one of the original four married daughters of Jereh Crawford.

I have worlds of data, some does not connect but after I have been able to work a line back with all dates to the first generation. there are three separate lines of Yancey desc. living in Tenn. in and around Memphis-- one of these lines I connect with great ease as it works back to my g.fathers brother Alex. Yancey who moved to Tenn. prior to the war. I have recently connected a Mrs. Chambers living in Washington State with the Wm. L. line She was a Miss Gregory of Va. and her g.g. father was Umbeerton Gregory and a sister of Wm. L. Yancey of Ala.

I have all N.C. records. wills marriage bonds etc and lots of Va data Everything from 4 pr 5 of the oldest Va. counties. I have hoped some day to connect more of it. and each time I hear from a Yancey, I am anxious to give them any help in working their lines back. I have abt 19 pages in typed form then there is a paragraph about Yancey Arms. if you send your data I will gladly go in into my data and help you connect your particular line.

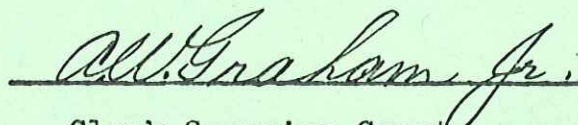
Dear Madam:

I was glad to receive the news paper clipping.

I think it must have been about 12 or 15 years ago that Jared and I visited a Mrs Yancey at Ucon who was the wife of Richard K. Yancey^{sr.} who was the son of Richard K. Yancey a brother of Hiram John Yancey our great grand father. so I think this is the same woman, who must have married since I seen her. as it gave her name as Mrs. Levi Yancey Scurlock, and as her son James Yancey. ^{the birthday and place is just the same.} I have her record as. a son. James dau. Elizabeth - and Grace. She told me her daughter Grace married James Corvill but after having four children she committed suicide. But maybe the

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other daughter married the same
James Covert. She told me all she
knew about the Yanceys, that is
where I first got started on our
direct line. She knew of Hyrum
leaving his wife and gave the
names of some to write to in Illinois.
She didn't ^{know} very much what had
become of most of them, as she
never heard from any one. Her husband
died in 1898. I would like to have
seen her again. I will write to some
of them again. If you folks should
ever be up there it would be nice
to look them up. The son James
was not married when I was there.
I am going to write to the Bishop as
I understood there were other Yanceys

Dear Sister Anderson;-

Brother P.W.T. Norman. of Manchester sent me along your letter of enquiry relating to Genealogical Research in Wales. He felt that he was unable to handle it, and ask if I would get in touch with you about it. I happen to be the Assistant Supervisor of the Genealogical Department, of the British Mission, and I also spend all my time in Genealogical Research, both for Saints there in Zion and also here, in addition I have quite a lot of work for the Genealogical Society of Utah.

Now with regard to your problem, I am planning for some research to be done in Wales, which will be put into hand some time in February. If you therefore can let me know your needs in that respect, it may be possible to have the work done then.

Will you therefore take the step of sending me along a copy of your family record, listed onto the Pedigree Charts and One Family Group Forms that we use in the Church, and with these as a guide I can see what could be done to get this work started for you.

With regard to costs for the research, it is not possible to give you a definite figure, so I usually tell the folks to send along a sum of about 15 Dollars towards the cost of the work. It would require quite that amount I am sure for work there in Wales, as it not only means time and Fees, but extra expence involved through the distance away, and also costs of living expences.

My usual plan is to endeavor to work for a number of people at the same time, in such localities, then the Expences are more or less pooled and so are the resources, this enables more work to be done, and the costs are correspondingly lower for more than one persons work being done.

I hope that I may have the pleasure of hearing from you further, and that much good will results from your desire to labor for your ancestors.

Dear Mrs. Anderson,

Your interesting letter, with Yancey notes, has been received. It will give me pleasure to send you my Yancey notes to review just as soon as they are returned by Mr. Wm P. Anderson of Cincinnati, Ohio. Mr. Anderson is preparing wonderful records on the Yancey, Anderson, Harris and many, many other families related to these, and I wanted to help him all I could in exchange for the service he is so unselfishly rendering. You, also, are doing all of us a great kindness in compiling data, and it will make me happy to have you see what I have--which isn't a great deal--from original court records. There will be no charge for this, and I shall mail you this material in the near future.

Regarding Austin Yancey--since he was connected with Tennessee, I think it probable he came from the branch that moved into the Carolinas from Virginia. I telephoned Mrs. Glass of this city this morning to ask what she had on this branch, as she descends from a Bartelot Yancey of N. Carolina, and she said she would call me if she found anything helpful. She seems to think the following two women may have data about her Yancey ancestry, but doesn't want her name used, should you write them:

Nov. 22 — Mrs. Frances Woodard, Danville, Va. and Mrs. F.W. Hagedorn, 903 Main St., Danville, Va.

It seems they are not wanting Mrs. Glass to know some old book is in their possession, or something to that effect--but they would, no doubt, write you freely regarding their records.

You state your ancestor, Hiram Yancey was born at Carey, Ky. I called the Post Office and they say the only Carey listed is Cary, Bell Co. Ky. Now Bell was not formed until about 1867 from Harlan and Knox. Knox was once a part of Lincoln and Harlan formed from Nelson county. When I go to Frankfort I shall see what I can find on Bell county and let you hear. I hope to go the first week in December.

I shall write you again before long.

My Dear Sir.

Yours of recent date received, we remember Mr. W.W.G. Buchard quite well . if you still know him please say hello to him for us and we have not forgotten. As for our branch of the family my knowledge is limited Our foreparents came over with the Oglettharp colony and settled in Oglettharp Co. Ga. my g. father as a young man went to Tenn, Marshall Co to teach school married and raised a large family, mostly boys. His name was David. I never knew personally but two of his brothers Tom and Jerry. His sons were William, David ~~William~~ John, Tom, Ben ~~Ben~~ and James. All of which moved with him to North east ~~Marshall~~ Texas at the close of the Civil War. from which point they have scattered to many parts of Uncle Sams domain, My g. fathers youngest brother was supposed to have perished with Fannin at Goliad, when his command was massacred.

My father married in Tenn. a Miss Emma Woodward and raised a family of ten, four boys and six girls. His boys, David (myself) walter, Frank and John. I married a Miss Mattie Bradley in Pope Co. Ark. and we are the parents of a large family, three boys and five girls. the boys were Sid. Roy, and Ira, Girls, Willie, Edith, Ruth, Edna and Erma,. When I say large I mean just that , All the girls I am sure will weigh 200 pounds and up, our baby is a 225 pounder. We think she is O.K. and she will always be baby to me.

William L. Yancey (the politician) was a cousin of my g. fathers, he was a prominent figure in the secession days. My g. father always said all the Yanceys spelling the name, Yancey. were related he said they were of Scotch Irish ancestry. I am truly sorry of this meager information does not throw any light on our fore bears. but our family was so far seperated from the others I never did learn much of our family back of my g. fathers own family.

You know we would be glad for you to come and see us. and we would like to take you up on your kind invitation to visit you , but I am cooking 78 on my next birthday and it is not at all likely we will ever be able to see you. Thanking you for your interesting letter and hoping we will hear again from you we are yours sincerely, D. Yancey.

Mrs A. W. Burns in her Pension of Franklin Co, Ky. has a copie of his Pension papers sent from said Co. You will also find him listed in Ky. Pension Roll act 1832 his No. S 1274 Va, Va. Dear Mr. Yancey:

On May 20th, 1941, I received a letter from my Washington Correspondent, Mr. John Burkett, 1838 Ontario Place, Washington, D.C., who has been doing some searching of National Archives for me, at a nominal fee. He searched the original census records which are available only in the National Capital.

He searched the Franklin County, Indiana, 1830 Census Records (no townships given), and found no Dukes, and only one Yancey family: "Charles W. Yancey, and wife, 50-60 (born 1770-1780); 1 female 20-30 (b.1800-1810); 1 male and 1 female 10-15 (b. 1810-1815); and 1 female 5-10 (b.1820-1825)." There is no doubt in my mind but that this is my great great grandfather and family, although I didn't know before that there were four children. Possibly two of them died. The male and female 10-15 must have been Ambrose and Elcey.

On Feb. 4, 1941, you sent me a list of eleven Charles Yanceys--many of them possible my great great grandfather Charles Yancey. The above census records, revealing the dates of birth 1770-1780, seem to cut the eleven to only three that could have been my ancestor.

First choice seems to be first on your list: Major Charles Yancey, who was born Mar. 22, 1770, at Buckingham, Va. m. Ann ~~Crawford~~ (or Nanney Spencer). Son of Rev. Robert Yancey and Ann Crawford. Robert was the son of Ensign Charles Yancey and Mlle. Dumas. (The date of birth fits; and my Charles Yancey's wife's name was Mary Ann; and on Oct. 17, 1838, when my ancestor, Mary Ann Yancey, deeded some land to Miami University, the deed was witnessed by a James Crawford--possible an uncle or a cousin of her husband's?) Would you please send me any data you may have on this line, names of descendants you may know about, correspondents, references, etc.?

Another possibility seems to be the Charles Yancey who was married on December 1, 1807, at Louisa County, Va., to Mary Edwards. His father was Augustine Yancey. This Charles could have been born 1770-1780, although that would make him 37 to 47 years of age--quite old for a first marriage? Could you send me more data on this family and any correspondents?

The Charles Yancey who was born about 1786, lived in Granville, N.C.; who was a son of James Yancey and Elizabeth Cudworth; m. Mary _____, of Granville, N.C. Had four children, born in N.C. Couldn't the four children listed in the 1830 Franklin Co., Ind., have been born in N.C., and then moved to Ind.? This Charles was six years too young, though, if the date of birth was right. The name of the wife fits both.

With the above additional data about my ancestors, I would appreciate hearing from you concerning your opinions on them. Your letters have been quite interesting and I appreciate hearing from you.

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THE HENCKEL FAMILY

GEORGE HENCKEL (1635-1678), (Henckel Records, No. 1, pp.12-40), the first yet known in our Henckel ancestral line, was born during the Thirty Years War and was thirteen years of age at its close. About two years thereafter (on July 25, 1650), he was entered as a student in the lower class at the University of Giessen. The next we learn of him he "became a schoolmaster in 1662 and was married to Eulalia Dentzer (1640-1700), from Steinmerk in 1666". George taught school and their children were born at Mehrenberg, where he died on January 29, 1678.

Children of George Henckel and Anna Eulalia Dentzer, from Evangelical Lutheran Church Records still in Mehrenberg near Weilberg, Germany (see "Henckel Family Records", May 1926, p.25):

Herr George Henckel was married on May 2, 1666, to Anna Eulalia Dentzer, daughter of Othmar Dentzer and his wife Loysa Wagner, daughter of Pfarrer Ludwig Wagner, of Steinberg. Anna Eulalia (Dentzer) Henckel was buried, March 11, 1700, in the Lutheran churchyard at Steinberg. A book published in 1819, "The Ruins of Mehrenberg and its Rulers"; pages 68 and 69, refers to him as "Herr Georg Henckel from Steinmerk in the District of Darmstadt, an honest and brave schoolmaster;" and adds that "his monument is still standing in marble in the churchyard of Mehrenberg". It also states that "he had five sons and one daughter"; and that "one of his sons studied theology and became a pastor in the Palatinate".

REV. ANTHONY JACOB HENCKEL (1668-1728), (Henckel Records, No. 14, Aug. 1939, p.645), the second child and oldest son of George, no doubt attended the village school before he entered the University of Giessen on May 5, 1688. He passed his theological examination at the University and was ordained as a Lutheran pastor at Eschelbronn February 28, 1692, (Henckel Records No. 4, pp.124-126). He married his second cousin Maria Elizabeth Dentzer (1672-1744) at Kirchain, Germany. To them were born twelve children.

He was active in the Lutheran ministry, serving five congregations in the Palatinate until June, 1717, when he left his last parish at Nockargemund and appears to have reached Philadelphia in the following September. He was accompanied by seven surviving children, four sons and three daughters, and other companions who formed a colony at New Hanover in what is now Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. The colony soon erected dwelling houses, a school house and later a church; hence it was distinctly a pioneer colony. The Reverend Anthony Jacob was public spirited and active in serving his own colony and gathering other scattered Germans into congregations until his death August 17, 1728. He and his wife (d. Jan. 23, 1744) are buried in St. Michael's Lutheran churchyard now in Germantown, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he was the first pastor. In addition to the grave stone, there is a Henckel Memorial tablet in the church. Will filed in Philadelphia, C.H.Ad. book C, page 109. 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SUSANNAH HENKEL (Sunna), (Henckel Records, No. 5, Jan. 1930, p.198-199), the eighth child of John Justus Henckel and Mary Magdalena Eschmann, was born Oct. 16, 1747, and was married to Philip Teter, son of George, Sr., of Hardy County, West Virginia. His will dated, September 28, 1813; recorded, January 2, 1816, Will Book, No. 4, p. 3, Pendleton County, West Virginia, mentions by name his youngest sons, Reuben and Moses; son "Reuben to pay to his three sisters, or their heirs, Sarah Holmick, Esther Teter, and Elizabeth Judy". Estate "to be divided among all of my children". Appraisement and Inventory Book, No. 4, p. 1: Receipts, in part of their legacies, dated from March 15, 1805, to February 16, 1806, as follows: Jacob Holmick, \$25; Samuel Teter, \$10; Joel Teter, \$20; Jonathan Teter, \$10; Adam Holmick, \$40. Other notes and papers from Joel, Benjamin, Jonathan, Reuben, and Moses Teter and from Adam Holmick, son Samuel, sole executor.

JOHN JUSTUS HENCKEL (1706-1778), the eight child of the Reverend Anthony Jacob Henckel, was the third son in age to accompany his father to Pennsylvania, (see Henckel Records No. 4, p. 129). He was born at Daudenzell, Germany, on Feb. 10, 1706; baptized on Feb. 17, 1706. Godparent was Herr John Justus Berthold, the Palatinate Collector (of taxes) of the collecteur (tax district) Minnenberg in Guttentbach.

The nun-cupative will of his father, dated Aug. 12, 1728, gave to his "two youngest sons, John Justus and Anthony Jacob", the home farm of 250 acres in New Hanover Township, then in Philadelphia County, now Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. John Justus (Jost, Josh, Joseph or Yost) Henckel received as his share 150 acres, which was later owned by his older brother George Rudolphus, who perfected its title March 7, 1734, and sold it in 1737. In 1730 John Justus Henckel married Mary Magdalena Eschmann.

By 1750, Yost (John Justus) Hinkle had sold his property in Pennsylvania, and by 1751 was settled on Dutchman's Creek in the Forks of the Yadkin, some 13 miles from Salisbury, then in Rowan County, now Davidson County, North Carolina. Because of Indian depredations, Jost Hinkle, his family, and others removed in 1760 to Rockingham County, Virginia, to what is now Germany Valley, Pendleton County, West Virginia. The colonists for the third time pioneered; they took up land, cut down the forests, built houses and constructed a fort for protection against the Indians on the tract of land which Justus Henckel had preempted.

"Hinkle's Fort" was located on the North Fork of the South Branch of the Potomac and was the only fort now located in what is Pendleton County, W. Va., that was used during the Revolutionary War. War Department Records indicate that a detachment of Virginia Militia was quartered there in June and July, 1778. A marker for the fort was dedicated Sept. 29, 1936. Thirty Henckels served in the Revolutionary War in Virginia and Pennsylvania.

John Justus Hinkle died in August, 1778, on his farm in Germany Valley, Virginia, and was buried "within a stone's throw" of the old "Hinklo's Fort". His wife was buried in the same grave. A monument to John Justus Henckel and his wife was erected October 10, 1935 (dedicated Sept. 29, 1936). John Justus Henckel's will was probated August, 1778, in Rockingham County, Virginia.
