Am lonesome already and that sounds silly. Also if you have the chance would like to hear your adventures after you get there. Will you fly or go by boat? But you are excited about it as anyone would be.

Have been thinking of making up some kind of a family outline and sending to all these people. It would give them something to think about and also a chance to get corrections and perhaps additions. What do you think? Don't know that I'll get it done but would like to try it.

Will copy two Doy's material and if you haven't already can send these yellow sheets on to Alice. Also am going to work on Thomas Civil War record. There may be something. It will be 2 more weeks before that film comes which will show what they have on Yanceys for Civil War period. Meantime I'll write to Ill (Military) Adjutants office to see if they have any enlistments from Thomas or William.

HISTORY OF CENTRAL CALIFORNIA

Memorial and Biographical History of Counties of Fresno,
Tulare and Kern - California 1892? P 785

C. A. Yancey, rancher and hotel-keeper at Toll House was born in Albemarle Co. Va. in 1833. His father R. H. Yancey, for many years Sheriff of same county and operated Yancey Mill. He emigrated to Jo Daviess Co., Ill. in 1835 and farmed. Educated in the public schools. He lived at home until 1850 when he crossed the plains to Calif. Came with Miller and Harper Emigrant Train who charged for transportation one half of the first years receipts. The company was quite large and they divided at the junction of Fort Hall and Salt Lake route and after traveling over 1,000 miles, as a singular coincidence, the trains again reunited with the union of the two trails and arrived at Hangtown Sept. 22, 1850.

Young Yancey then followed mining in Amador County about one year. In 1852 he bought a team and began freighting from Stockton to the mining districts, which he followed until 1856 and then bought a ranch and ran a hotel on the north side of the San Joaquin River. He followed ranching until 1858 and then went into the stock business which he followed until 1868. He then came to Toll House and bought a claim of about 900 acres. He built a hotel 18 x 90 ft. with a dining room 20 x 40 and has since built up a town around him consisting of six dwellings, box factory 30 x 80, blacksmith shop, store and necessary barns and outbuildings all of which he owns and rents. He is ever ready to build for a renter but says he has nothing to sell.

Mr. Yancey went there without a dollar in ready cash and the results speak volumes for his enterprise and sagacity. He carries on general farming and all the deciduous trees (fruit) grow to advantage.

Mr. Yancey was ~~born~~ at Millerton in 1860 to Mrs Block a widow with two children. She was a daughter of Judge Gillum Baley. Mr. and Mrs. Yancey have had nine children but only three survived. They lost five children inside of eleven days in a terrible epidemic of Diphtheria.

Mr. Yancey was appointed postmaster at Tollhouse under the admin. of President Hayes in 1876. He was a charter member of the 1st Odd Fellows Lodge established at Millerton

p 1387 Mrs America Frances Yancey

That women have made a positive success in practically every field of life, and even in those undertakings requiring capacity and experience for which men used to be regarded as alone equipped, is demonstrated in such a story as that of Mrs. America Frances Yancey, long identified with one of the well known hostelrys of California. She is the daughter of Judge Gillum Baley, a native of Illinois, where he was born not far from Springfield, on June 19, 1813. He died in Nov 1895. Her mother was Permelia Eleanor Meyers before her marriage, and she was born in West Tennessee on June 22, 1819. Their marriage took place in Missouri, and in that State, before he came West to California, Mr. Baley engaged in farming and stock-raising. He was also judge ther for a couple of years; and the reader will recall that Missouri court decisions in those days

generally meant a short-cut to justice.

In 1849 her father crossed the great plains with two of her brothers, and at once went to mining, continuing in that hazardous enterprise until 1851, when he returned to Missouri. After seven years more in the Iron State, he started again to cross the continent hoping once more to enjoy the good things of the promised land. He started in a caravan of ox teams, but when the party reached the Colorado River they were robbed by the Indians. He therefore put back to Albuquerque, N.M. and remained there ten months. A new mule-team party was later made up and, joining it, Mr Baley came to California by way of Yuma.

In December, 1860, he reached Visalia, and soon came on to Fort Miller in Fresno County. He located at the town of Millerton, and again tried his luck at mining- this time along the San Joaquin River. He followed mining up to 1866, when he was elected County Judge, and that high office he held for twelve years, serving the last term in Fresno, where both he and his wife passed away. He was also County Treasurer for a couple of years. At one time he bought a grocery store, but in the spring of 1898 he sold it again. In the same town he ran a boarding house for a number of years, Mrs. Baley being an experienced housewife and manager.

Mrs. Yancey was born in Platte County, Missouri on Sept 30, 1840 and came with her parents to California and Fresno County; and while on route to California she was married ~~xx~~ in New Mexico, on Sept 9, 1859, to August Block, a native of Nockel, Prussian Poland, who was journeying to California with the Judge Baley train. Mr. Block died on March 15, 1864, having followed farming until his death, leaving two children: Minnie who married Thomas Dean and died in San Francisco; and William, who makes his home with Mrs. Yancey.

Later in July, 1865, Mrs. Block married Charles Abraham Yancey, a native of Virginia who came to California in 1854 and followed mining and teaming, continuing in that line until 1868. The first of August in that year, Mr. and Mrs. Yancey opened the Toll House, the first hotel in that section: and while managing that he also engaged in farming and stock-raising. Mr. Yancey passed away on July 23, 1911, and the responsibilities he had cheerfully borne then devolved upon the brave woman who had been so truly a help-mate. Like Mr. Block and indeed like Mr. Baley, Mr. Yancey left behind him an enviable record as citizen, neighbor and husband.

Mr. and Mrs. Yancey, through their generosity and kindness, endeared themselves to everyone and were familiarly known as Uncle Abe and Aunt Frank, and to this day Mrs. Yancey is addressed as Aunt Frank. By her marriage to Mr. Yancey she had two children: Mrs. Virginia E. Mills, who with her husband, now runs the Toll House: and Max H., engaged in general merchandising at Tollhouse.

Since her husbands death, Mrs. Yancey continues to live at Tollhouse having turned the management of the hotel over to her daughter, Mrs. Virginia Mills. Aside from her Tollhouse ranch of over 700 acres, she with Mrs Mills and her nephew Robert M. Johnson own the Johnson ranch of 1,000 acres in the Pine Ridge School dist. which is well watered and well wooded and an ideal ranch for stock, and on this place Mrs Yancey enjoys spending her summers. She is an old-timer, and it is interesting to hear her tell of early-day events.

GEORGE A. YANCEY

Two miles south of the town proper of Bakersfield, Kern County lies the improved and up-to-date farm of George A. Yancey, a farmer of prominence in the community, who has prospered well since his coming to Calif. in 1897, at which time he became a permanent and loyal resident of the county, giving his support to all projects proposed for the advancement and development of his community.

William Yancey, father of George A. was born in Tennessee and was formerly a resident of Indiana, where in Benton county his son was born March 12, 1860. He married Maria Onesettler, born in Penn. and together they made their way to Calif. in 1895, settling in the Weed Patch in Kern County. Inured to the hardships of pioneer life, they soon found themselves the owners of an improved and well-cultivated farm which they had acquired by their hard labors from the land in its wild state, and many happy days were spent there in the enjoyment of their well earned prosperity. The father passed away in 1903, the mother, now at the age of 72 yrs, making her home at Glennville, Cal.

Receiving his primary education in his native county, George A. Yancey made his home in Indiana for many years, growing to manhood and developing splendid traits of character which his parents had instilled in him in their quiet, even home life. At the age of 26 he removed to Cass county, Mo. where he was married to Miss Sadie Bateman, a native of Coshocton county, Ohio, the daughter of Mathew and Martha (McFarland) Bateman, who were natives of Ohio and Penn., respectively. She was reared in Cass county Mo. Mr. and Mrs. Yancey became the parents of two children, Gertrude, who is now the wife of Bob Kincer, a farmer of Gosford; and John, who is at home with his parents. Mr. Yancey made his home in Missouri for many years, following the vocation of farmer, which has been his life work. His interest had ever been turned toward the west and with the thorough understanding of a farmer as to the exceptional conditions of the soil and the climate in Calif. he decided in 1897 to follow his parents to Kern county, where upon arrival he purchased his present forty-acre farm on Union Ave and Brundage lane, just two miles south of the town of Bakersfield. Building house and barns, he set out to improve this land AND SUCH HAS BEEN HIS SUCCESS THAT TODAY HE IS THE OWNER of one of the best producing and generally well-kept farms in the vicinity devoted principally to alfalfa. His wife is also the owner of twenty acres of land on Union ave., which tract is situated six miles south of Bakersfield and is a select piece of property. A Democrat in political matters, Mr. Yancey is well versed in party affairs and is alive to all questions of importance concerning his party's welfare. He unites fraternally with the Modern Woodmen and Mrs. Yancey is a member of the Congregational church.

JOSEPH E. YANCEY

The suburban community known as Broad Ripple, which then was adjacent to and now forms a portion of the city of Indianapolis, Ind. made an interesting environment for the early years of Joseph E. Yancey, who was born on a farm at that place March 12, 1860, being a son of Joseph A. Yancey, a Kentuckian, who became well-known among the stock raisers in the vicinity of Indianapolis. In that city he was educated, and at the age of sixteen he started out for himself, working at various occupations until he came to Calif. in 1880 and settled at Bakersfield. For two winters he carried on his studies in the Crocker school, while in the intervening summers he was employed as a clerk or farm hand. During the year 1882 he entered the employ of the Kern County Land Company, then known by the firm title of Haggin and Carr, and for three years he acted as superintendant of their Mountain View ranch, after which for two years he followed mining at the Long Tom mine. A subsequent experience lasting two years as roadmaster of the Sumner road district was followed by employment in teaming, general contracting and building canals for the Kern county Land Co. and for the Southern Calif. Construction Co. at Barstow. The business of a contractor filled his time and kept him busily occupied until July, 1899, when he discontinued in order to become street superintendent of Bakersfield. In that capacity he served for twelve consecutive years or until after the consolidation of Bakersfield and Kern into one city. In addition to filling that position he also served as city health officer and plumbing inspector. In an official capacity he proved prompt, efficient, reliable and intelligent and the difficult duties of his responsible post were discharged with exactness and to the general satisfaction. Since resigning as street superintendent he has resumed contracting and building and now makes a specialty of general contracting and building. The supervision of his building operations consumes all of his time, although he is also interested in the McKittrick Oil Co. and in oil lands in the Temblor and McKittrick districts.

Fraternal connections have been formed by Mr. Yancey with the B.P.O.E. and Ancient Order of United Workmen. Politically he votes with the Republican party. Some years after he came to Kern Co. he married Miss Rose Williams, who was born in Fort Scott, Kan., but came to Calif. at an early age and received a superior education in the schools of this state. From an early age she has been a devoted member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and in the faith of that denomination she reared her adopted daughter, Lena, now Mrs. Harvey DeWar of Bakersfield. Her parents George and Achsah (Riggs) Williams, were identified with pioneer agricultural interests in Kansas, but left that state in 1875 to identify themselves with the Pacific coast Country. The beautiful philanthropic spirit which throughout life has been a leading element in the character of Mrs. Yancey, led her to take up work among the homeless children and waifs of Bakersfield, and in cooperation with Mrs. Coolbaugh she started the Kern County Children's Shelter, which from the first has proved a most important undertaking and has increased in size to such an extent that about 45 children are now cared for by the organization.

T. M. YANCEY

The subject of this narrative, was born in Pulaski, Giles Co. Tenn on Sept. 23, 1826, when nearly nine years old his parents took him to Marshall Co. Miss., where he was educated. Mr. Yancey enlisted in the first Mississippi Infantry, commanded by Jefferson Davis, in which Regiment he served with honor till the close of the War.

Mr. Yancey early in life learned the printer's trade, following it ~~unxxx~~ after returning from the war until he came to this state.

In 1851 he crossed the plains and first made a halt in California at Sonora, Tuolumne Co. He came to Columbia on 17 Sept. 1852 where he was engaged in mining until May 1853 when he went on the Gazette and continued on the paper until 1858. In October that year he was appointed Deputy Sheriff, in which office he remained for three years. In 1863 he moved to Mono Co. and was appointed one of the Commissioners of the Mono road. In the following year we find him at Silver City, Idaho, where he remained abt one year. He returned to Sonora and entered the "Democrat" office and remained there for 11 years and 4 mos.

He was elected Sheriff of Tuolumne Co. in 1876 and so faithfully has he discharged the duties of office that he has been his own successor to the present time. One cannot speak too highly of Mr. Yancey's administration as Sheriff.

Common thieves, highwaymen, stage robbers and murderers have all found their detection and conviction sure if their depredations were committed in the jurisdiction of our sheriff.

Mr. Yancey married Rosa B. Crowell on the 12th of Sept, 1860. She is a native of Maine. Their children are Louisa (Mrs George McQuade), Mabel, Edna, Henry L., Nellie.

The State Library at Sacramento, Calif maintains a large cross reference file for information found in the old newspapers of the San Francisco area. The Call-Bulletin and the Examiner.

On one of these is listed the death of Sheriff T.F. Yancey possibly the same man. I did not have the newspaper brought from the stacks to examine. An interested person could no doubt get this information by writing to the Library (California Room)

Boshier his heirs and assigns, a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Cumberland and State of Virginia, being the tract of land the said Robert J. Yancey formerly lived, containing Fifty six acres be the same more or less and adjoining the lines and lands of Littleberry Scruggs, James M. Smith, John Spencer, and Charles Blake dec'd together with all and singular the appurtenances thereunto belonging, to have and to hold the said tract or parcel of land to him the said John C. Boshier his heirs and assigns forever, and the said Robert J. Yancey and his wife Elizabeth and John Yancey and his wife Mary for themselves their heirs Executors and administrators, do forever warrant and defend the right and title of said tract or parcel of land to him the said John C. Boshier, his heirs and assigns forever, against the claims of all persons, whatsoever. In witness whereof the said Robert J. Yancey, and his wife Elizabeth and John Yancey and his wife Mary, have hereunto set their hands, and affixed their seals, the day and the year first above written.

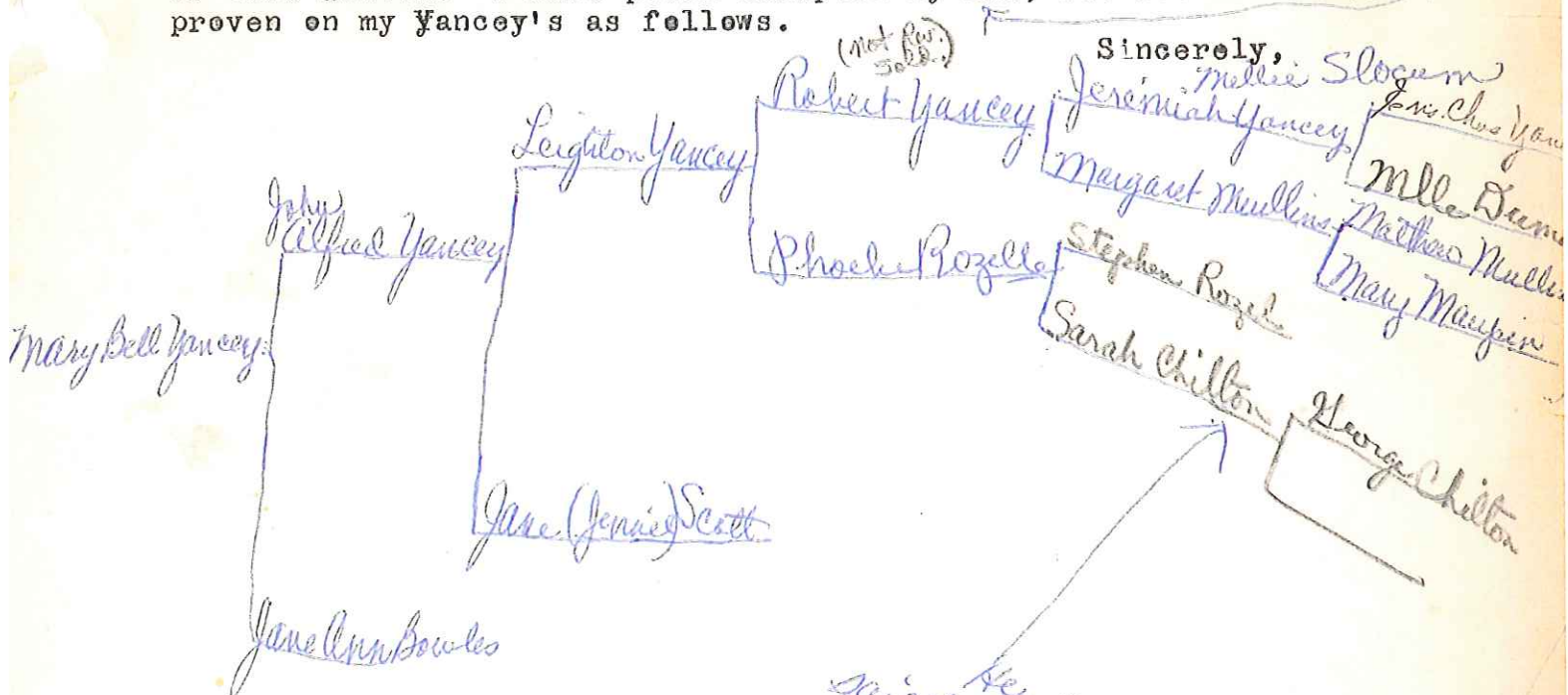

For the year 1946 I am going to put down here an account of all genealogical work done and an account of all money spent.

In the fall of 1944 I received \$15.00 from Arley for membership to Chicago Institute of Genealogy and some other expenses, I also have check stub showing \$28.00 20.00 of which was handed in by members of the family to get the temple work at Logan finished up, the 8.00 was taken out of the Yancey funds, and the 28.00 sent to Logan and the work done for 56 male names.

Then twice during the year 43-44 I drew some money but cant remember just how much, about 25.00 at one time I believe and 40.00 another time, Out of the 25.00 I paid my expenses and paid a research worker to help with the records at the Library.

Out of the 40.00 I paid 10.00 to help do the work on the Wood genealogy. & the 5.00, Aunt Myra wanted from the family for the upkeep or something of Grandpa Tolman's grave, & gave her 8.00 to help on Tolman genealogy, also bought some record books & supplies.

About Sept. 1943 I got supplies, typing paper etc at Hayes Book Shop of

Sept. 1. 1944 Arley gave Aunt Myra a check of 50.00 and

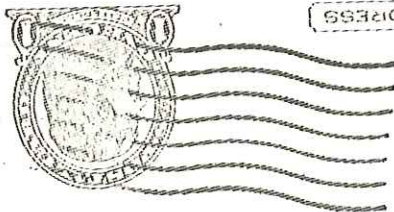

Hyndenburg and its Neighbors.

Charles Yancey, the immediate ancestor of this family in Hyndenburg, came to Virginia about the year 1674 with his wife who was the granddaughter of Alexander Leighton, the famous Scotch divine, whose persecution was one of the greatest scandals of the reign of Charles I. She was also a niece of Robert Leighton, another famous churchman, who was Bishop of Dunblane and later Archbishop of Glasgow. Charles Yancey's name on the quit rent roll in 1704 for land in Henry William County.

The will of Robert Yancey his son is recorded in 1745 on the first page of the first will book in Louisa County Court House. Though badly worm eaten, the name of his wife and of his sons, Charles, Robert, James, and Richard can readily be made out.

James Yancey, son of Robert, grandson of the first Charles, was in the Revolutionary War, a major under the command of General Green. After the Revolution he settled in South Carolina and married Miss Cudworth. He was grandfather of

Charles, son of Robert, married Mademoiselle Dumas, daughter of Jeremiah Dumas, of an old French family, who had settled in Louisa County. Charles had several sons, Jeremiah, Archelaus, Charles and Robert. Many of Jeremiah's descendants settled in Albemarle County. Charles, known as Captain Charles, married Mary, daughter of David Crawford, and left descendants in Amherst. He studied for the ministry and was ordained in England by the Arch bishop of Canterbury. He was rector of Trinity and Tillotson Parishes in Louisa County, and was the first preacher in America to preach universal salvation. (See Calverts and Their Idios) He lived on Little River, in Louisa County, and after his death, his wife moved to Buckingham County with their children. Major Charles Yancy was their son. He was known as the "Duke of Buckingham" on account of the princely hospitality which characterized his home and was
